JERSEY LILY SALE WILL DRAW CROWD SEPT. 6

Chris Gesme, of Lents, was in Gresham Saturday arranging matters in connection with his sale of dairy cattle on his place, the Jersey Lily Dairy. The place is located one mile north of Lents on the Mount Scott car line on the Powell Valley road at the foot of Kelly's Butte. Mr. Gesme has been eight years in building up the fine dairy herd which he will offer for sale on Thursday, September 6.

Mr. Gesme's reason for the sale at this time is the fact of the shortage of help and the extreme difficulty of conducting his large dairy under war conditions. All three of his drivers have been drafted, one having already gone into the service.

This sale will commence at 10:30 a. m., a free luncheon being served during the noon hour. The herd to be disposed of at this time includes 41 milch cows, 11 heifers from one to two years old, all tuberculin tested, grade Jersey, Holstein and Durham. Mr. Gesme has spent eight years in building up this herd; all of the cows are young but one, and all are big milkers.

There is also one Jersey bull, one 1100-lb. horse, one team of horses, a lot of double and single harness, hay rake, milk wagons, delivery wagons, surrey, top buggy, plows, cultivators, wood rack, crates, bottles, and other articles too numerous to mention. FIRE NEAR MT. HOOD CHECKED, NO DANGER

Cool and misty weather has checked forest fires in the Mount Hood country, according to reports from there yesterday. The fire near Government Camp which has burned across the toll road is said to be entirely under control. Prospects are bright in that section for early rain. The toll road has been blocked only for a short time.
