BUSINESS SITUATION THROUGHOUT NATION

Through the courtesy of the First State Bank of Gresham, the Outlook has been favored with the following extracts from The Collins Forecast, a monthly publication of Philadelphia:

The business capacity of America has been freshly demonstrated by the rapidity with which our industries, commerce and transportation have adapted themselves with scarcely any friction to the vast requirements of War.

Since the United States entered the war, a short space of less than six months, we have made provision for the contest in the way of men and money to an extent probably never equaled in any similar period by any nation in the world's history.

The nation's quick preparation for war, without serious disturbance to ordinary trade and industry, affords the strongest ground for confidence that business will be sustained during the war and that when peace comes we shall have had such a striking example of American resourcefulness, energy and skill that our future industrial and commercial progress should be multiplied many times by this proof of what can be done when we set about our work in real earnest.

Today the chief business of the country is war, and the gratifying manner in which the nation has met the immense and sudden demands made upon it in this emergency, gives an assurance that when the time comes for us to aid in the vast work of reconstruction and restoration throughout the world, we shall not fail.

GRESHAM CANNING TEAM WINS SECOND PREMIUM

In the canning contest at the state fair last week there were entries from eleven counties. The results showed Wasco county's team to be winner of the first premium; Multnomah county second; Jackson county third and Tillamook county fourth.

The Multnomah team went from Gresham, having been the prize winner at the county fair over several other teams from other localities. They were instructed by Mrs. W. R. Kern who went with them to Salem. The girls of the team were Mabel Metzger, Bonita Stillions and Elizabeth Schwedler.

The county fair paid the expenses of the team and their instructor to Salem, and the state fair took care of them while at the fair grounds.

BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION HERE

A branch of the Union Building and Loan association of Portland is in process of formation in Gresham. Signatures of ten persons are to be obtained to organize which will be done in a short time.

The Union Building and Loan association is a strong organization and is under state supervision and control. Its plan is to issue certificates for \$100 and up which may be paid for at the rate of 50 cents per month. Thus, ten shares will require \$5 per month until \$500 has been paid in.

A further disposition of the money allows loans to shareholders who own real estate for building purposes. In the event of such loans the borrower gets his note back when the share matures.
