**RETIRED MINISTER AND LETTER CARRIER DEAD**

David Wolfe, for more than ten years a rural letter carrier at Boring and before that at Orient, died at Emanuel hospital in Portland yesterday. He was born in Springfield, Ohio, 74 years ago and had lived in Oregon about 18 years, nearly all of the time on a farm near Boring in Clackamas county. He is survived by his widow and four grown children, E. Gladys, Guy E., Lem W. and Glen C.

Mr. Wolfe was a member of M. A. Ross Post, G. A. R. of Gresham and was well known.

His funeral will take place from the Finley chapel on Thursday afternoon at 2:30, Rev. W. T. Kerr officiating. Interment will be in Greenwood cemetery.

Mr. Wolfe was a retired Methodist minister and had always been active in his community in all good works. About twelve years ago he became a rural letter carrier at Orient, but when that postoffice was discontinued he was transferred to Boring, yet served the same route that he had served from Orient.

His resignation from the service was announced only a few weeks ago. He had continued as a letter carrier as long as he was able to serve his route, which indicates his character for doing his duty wherever he found it.

**TROUTDALE STORE SCENE OF ROBBERY**

Aaron Fox's general merchandise store at Troutdale was the object of a burglarous enterprise on Sunday night last, when goods to the amount of \$800 were taken. Morris McGinnis discovered that the store had been robbed when he passed that way on his way to work early Monday morning.

Among the missing articles were a large lot of auto tires, tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, boots, shoes, candy, bacon and butter. These articles had recently been added to the stock and were fresh and new.

Deputy Sheriff Phillips, Hurlburt, Christofferson and Rexford made an examination of the premises and are working on several clues. They are of the opinion that the work is that of an organized band which has robbed more than a dozen other stores in Marion, Washington, Yamhill and Clackamas counties recently.

The front doors have been "jimmied" in the same manner in all these burglaries and practically the same class of goods was taken from all of them. An effort is being made to locate the place where the goods are stored or have been sold.

**FRANK WRIGHT IN GEORGIA ENCAMPMENT**

The following are extracts from a letter recently received by Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Wright from their son Frank. Although the young soldier is not from this vicinity, his parents live here and he visited here about a year ago. He writes from Camp Gordon, Atlanta, Georgia, where he is with the 307th Field Signal Battalion. After giving the usual day's schedule of drills, mess and recreation he adds:

"Today has been different. We got up at 5, started on a march at 6, marched until 11. I think we marched about twenty miles. We had to stop right along with three to five minutes' rest occasionally. There were a lot of fellows dropped out along the road. (The whole company of about 30,000 went.) In my company there were three dropped out. I thought when we started if I made three miles I would be doing good. It was some tough grind but I stuck it out. The hospital boys followed along with trucks and doctors to pick up the men who could not make it, and there were a lot of them. I could hardly get down stairs this morning to start with, but I stuck it out. It is doing me good. I feel fine except for being lame, but I will get over that in a short time.

We have good warm beds, a cot with springs, a straw tick, two heavy wool blankets and a comfort. We have plenty to eat, coffee without cream, all you want for breakfast and supper, lemonade for dinner, meat three times a day, beans once, hot cakes, rice, sweet potatoes, and potatoes, apple sauce, oat meal and a few other things, no butter or milk but plenty of sugar. We fare well.

There is a nice bunch of fellows in our battalion, about 500. They put me in the outpost company and in the wire company of 75 men. The captain told me today that he asked for me as he had no man who understood telephone and telegraph both. If I work, I can get something pretty good, maybe. I am going to try, anyway.

They have these Y. M. C. A. buildings scattered all over the camp. Every evening they have some kind of an entertainment. They each have a library and writing benches, give you writing paper and treat you royally, all free to the soldiers. Well, the entertainment has started in the other room, so will close and write again soon. Your son, FRANK."
