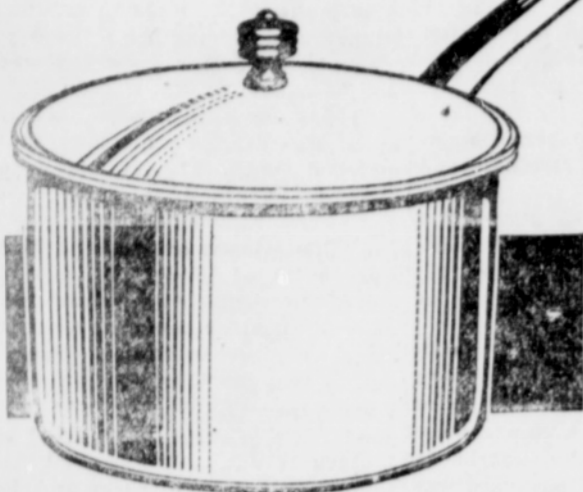

### SCHOOL PROJECT PLANS ARE ADOPTED

It was announced last Tuesday in the Outlook that a full school project department would be inaugurated by the county fair and that County School Superintendent W. C. Alderson would give the assistance of his office in order to make it a success. The plans have already been perfected and the sum of \$250 has been set aside for next year's premiums in the division which is expected to become one of the most important of the county fair. Two projects have been formed, with prizes ranging from \$5 down to \$1. Some of the exhibits will receive five prizes if there are that many entries, but others will only get three. This is explained by the fact that corn is not so successful here as potatoes, nor is the sheep or chicken industry or first-year sewing very far advanced in this county among the school children.
