AVIATION SERGEANT WRITES FROM SCHOOL

Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Brasswell of Pleasant Valley have received a letter from their son, Boyd O., who is a sergeant in the aviation corps and is attending an aviation school at Austin, Texas. Sergeant Brasswell answers some questions asked him by his parents and gives interesting descriptions of conditions at the school. His letter bears the date of October 31 and is in part as follows:
I will try to tell you all about the school and the place here. Board and room cost me \$20 a month and sergeant pay is \$44 a month plus computation of rations, which is \$30 and room, light and fuel, which is \$19.72. Yes, I am going to try to be an officer, but I am going to try. I passed gas engine examination perfectly and am instructing a little bit in it. I will be here for six months anyhow, before I can make an officer. I would have been with Ellis Forsgren if I had not been in the hospital when he went. If the war lasts eight months longer I will be there. Yes, I have flown and have fallen once, but just got my face skinned and my leg bruised. From what the paper says about Ellis, he will be flying soon. I did that at Kelly Field. That is the way they all begin, then they go to the school and train for an officer's commission and when they get that they go to San Antonio or New York and complete the course in flying. You see, you cannot be a licensed flier until you are a lieutenant or captain. About seventy-five aeroplanes have fallen at Kelly Field and none has been killed yet. That looks good to me. Don't any of you worry, for I will come back an honor to my country, if the war lasts long enough. I will be glad when I am fighting in France. I am not afraid to fight, one bit. If I get to go you may not see me any more, for the average life of a flier is eight hours. The air feels like riding down hill in a large car.

John Brown, Plaintiff vs. Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell, Defendants.
To Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell, the above named Defendants.

In the name of the State of Oregon you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 2d day of January, 1918, and if you fail so to appear and answer, the plaintiff will take judgment against you and each of you as follows:
That the defendants Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell are indebted to plaintiff on contract of employment in the sum of \$290 with interest from the 1st day of July, 1917, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum until paid, and that plaintiff have judgment against said defendants and each of them for said sum, together with costs and disbursements herein, also that the real property hereinafter described, which has been attached in this action be sold to satisfy the plaintiffs demands, as above set forth, and that execution issue in said behalf.
