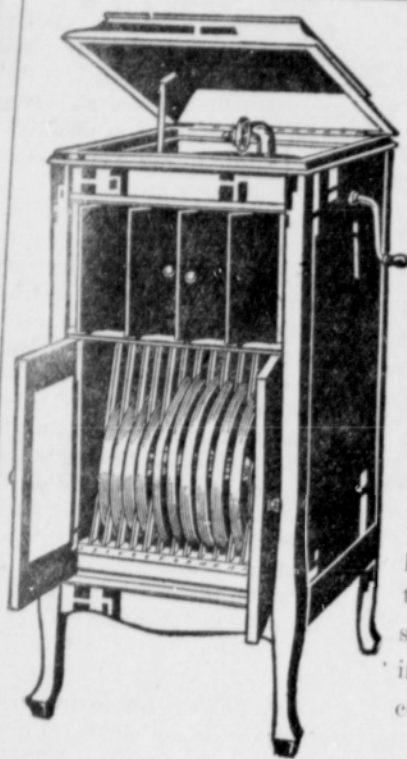


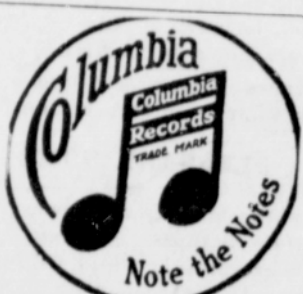

SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon for the County of Multnomah.

John Brown, Plaintiff vs. Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell, Defendants.

To Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell, the above named Defendants.

In the name of the State of Oregon you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled court and cause on or before the 2d day of January, 1918, and if you fail so to appear and answer, the plaintiff will take judgment against you and each of you as follows:

That the defendants Henry A. Latourell and Charles H. Latourell are indebted to plaintiff on contract of employment in the sum of \$290 with interest from the 1st day of July, 1917, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum until paid, and that plaintiff have judgment against said defendants and each of them for said sum, together with costs and disbursements herein, also that the real property hereinafter described, which has been attached in this action be sold to satisfy the plaintiffs demands, as above set forth, and that execution issue in said behalf. Said real property so attached is described as follows:

"Beginning at the northwest corner of the tract of land conveyed by John Thomas and Ane Thomas, his wife, to John Rometsch, by deed dated March 16th, 1906, which deed is recorded on page 31, book 357, of the Multnomah county deed records; thence running south 19 degrees and 01 minutes east along the west boundary line of said John Rometsch tract to the southwest corner thereof; thence south 19 degrees and 01 minutes east producing said line to a point 100 feet south 19 degrees and 01 minutes east of place of beginning; thence south 69 degrees and 59 minutes west 51 feet to a point; thence north 19 degrees and 01 minutes west 100 feet to the south line of Powell Valley road; thence north 69 degrees and 59 minutes east 51 feet to the place of beginning. 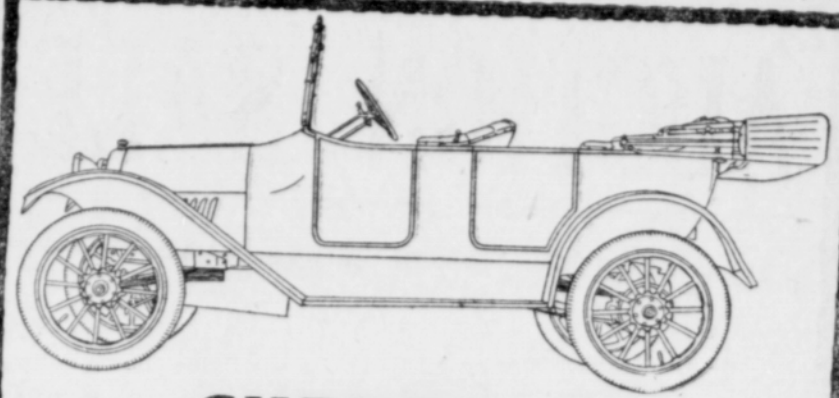
