ar would be fixed at three pounds a month.

County Commissioner Holman made a showing of his methods of conducting the finances of the county in every department except the road division. He stated that he is in a minority when it comes to spending money for road work and intimated that the other two commissioners are doing it all in that line. His showing of profits in the operation of the Interstate bridge and county farm was interesting and was warmly applauded. His explanation of the large expenditure of road funds brought out one of the resolutions read and adopted after he had left the hall.

Judge Morrow spoke on several different subjects and made a hit on all of them. He was a sort of free lance and explained that this was his first full day at Pomona which he would remember all the rest of his life as a new experience. He was one of the last to leave the hall and regretted that there were no more loganberry pies after Rufus Holman had eaten his dinner.

James Kelly spoke on the county council organization, declaring it to be an imperfect institution. He wanted, instead of one representative from each grange, a committee from each district, bringing the council up to about thirty members. That plan would enable the county agent to get full information upon any farm subject in a few hours whenever the necessity arose for it upon a call from the agricultural departments.

Mr. Kelly stated that the Japanese were the salvation of the farming problem at present. Japanese farmers are now unable to get help of their own kind for less than \$80 a month and board, and some Japanese farm hands are demanding a hundred dollars a month. Efficiency is needed, Mr. Kelly said, and he believed that more attention should be given the labor problem.

His suggestion as to an increase in the membership of the county council was endorsed by the grange and all subordinate granges were urged to give the plan every assistance.

A resolution was adopted urging every member of the grange to become a Red Cross member so as to make the order 100 per cent efficient in that direction.

R. W. Gill and wife were elected Pomona representatives to the Oregon State grange which will meet at Salem in May. Four of the subordinate granges are entitled to delegates this year—Gresham, Fairview, Evening Star and Woodburn. They were instructed to elect their representatives at the February meeting.

Pomona grange passed a vote of appreciation of the W. C. T. U., the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. and all kindred organizations.

Five candidates were initiated in the fifth degree, the ceremony being followed by a musical and literary program under the direction of Pomona Lecturer, Mrs. E. D. Palmer.

A rising vote of thanks was tendered Columbia grange for its splendid reception of Pomona and the dinners furnished.

The next session will be held at Lents on the third Wednesday in March.

REGISTRANTS SLOW TO BE EXAMINED

The Gresham questionnaire Board is constantly on duty every day in the city hall, represented by a portion of its members. tion, that we do not believe that conditions warrant such an amount as necessary for the keeping of the roads of Multnomah county in condition for all travel during the year. We would respectfully ask the county commissioners to be more careful of their expenditures of the road funds.
