Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Dunbar spent Christmas with their son, J. Dunbar and family of Portland.

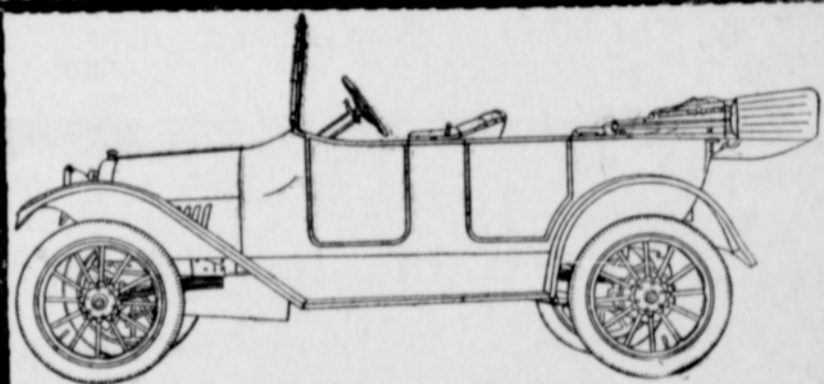
