**CHEAPER GAINS.**

The slop bucket method of feeding fattening hogs is rapidly disappearing, especially where the most of the ration is grain. The self feeder for grain is proving so much more economical by saving feed and labor.

This method of feeding has been tried out in all parts of the United States with good success.

The following are the results of a large number of trials at different Experiment stations and covers about 600 hogs fed:

	Hand fed	Self fed
Average days fed.....	82.2	68.5
Average daily gain per head, lbs.....	1.23	1.92
Average daily feed per head, lbs.....	5.47	8.
Average amount of feed per 100 lbs gain, lbs.....	445.	417.

In order to save money for the purchaser, and make money for the seller, this office will act as an information bureau for seed wheat and other farm seeds as the season advances.

The varieties which have been recommended for western Oregon are Defiance, Marquis, Red Fife and Huston. Several farmers in the eastern part of the county have reported good results from Marquis. We would like to have any party having any of the above varieties or any other good variety of seed wheat to let our office know either by card or by phone.
