LEARNING SIGNAL CODE INTERESTING WORK

In a recent letter received by Mr. and Mrs. Dan Wright from their son Frank, who is in a southern training camp, he tells of the experience of camp life and the value to the boys of the training. He says, "We are learning a lot of things here. It is worth money to us in health and knowledge both. We signal with our hands, with flags (three different ways,) with mirrors, with lanterns, with flash lights and we have a lot more ways to learn yet. Our main way is by buzzer, that is the same as telegraph, only you use the buzzer instead of the telegraph instrument. We keep up communications between brigade headquarters and division headquarters. We use the buzzer all the time, but in case our wires are broken, we use visual signalling. We will also use carrier pigeons."
