ADVISES LIGHT OIL FOR COLD WEATHER

"Ford owners would save them-
selves a whole lot of trouble in cold
weather if they would use a good
oil of light body refined from asphalt
base crude," said C. A. McCarthy for
the Standard Oil company, in discus-
sing cold-weather lubrication yester-
day.

"In the Ford motor, the clutch is
combined with the engine and lubri-
cated from the crank case. If the
oil gets thick and sluggish in cold
weather, the discs of the clutch stick
together. This is what causes hard
cranking and that persistent creep-
ing forward as if the clutch were
partly engaged.

"Now an oil refined from asphalt
base crude flows freely down to
zero. It has a natural zero cold test,
because there is no paraffin to thicken
in cold weather. Hence when
such an oil is used there is no trouble
with hard starting, inefficient lubri-
cation or sticky clutch."

The manufacture and consump-
