HOUSEWIVES CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED IN GRESHAM

A housewives campaign has been started in Portland by the Food Administration to bring to the women accurate knowledge of the best ways of preparing the foods ordered by the Administration in connection with the new stringent regulations.

Accordingly, arrangements have been made with the department of home economics of the Oregon Agricultural College to teach the gospel of Hooverized cooking to Portland women. A series of four demonstrations and lectures has been planned to be held on successive Monday evenings in the basement of the First Presbyterian church.

Mrs. G. F. Honey and Mrs. Roy Kern were appointed leaders of the Gresham district and will attend these weekly meetings in Portland and bring the message to the Gresham women. The first meeting will be in the library Wednesday afternoon at 2:30. Women are urged to attend and to make any suggestions from their own experiments in this line.
