One cup of mashed potatoes, 2 cups white flour, 3 level teaspoonfuls baking powder, 1 teaspoonful salt, 2 tablespoonfuls Crisco and one-half cup of milk.

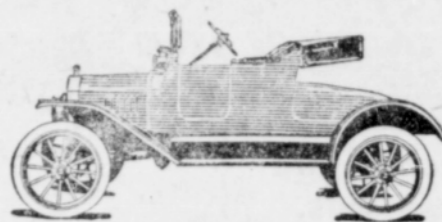
