CANNERY TO CONTINUE PRESENT MANAGEMENT

At the meeting of the stockholders of the Gresham Fruit Growers association held last Monday, it was decided to renew the contract entered into last year with W. W. Cotton as to the management of the cannery. The arrangement seemed satisfactory last year and it is believed that the association can do no better than to continue the same conditions.

An announcement which will be of special interest to the growers of the community was made to the effect that higher prices will be paid on a number of products than were contracted for. The advance on the berries is a cent a pound. Raspberries will bring \$120 a ton at the cannery next season, loganberries \$80, blackcap raspberries \$120 and Lawton blackberries \$80. The price on Refugee beans has been advanced to \$60 and on beets from \$25 to \$40. These prices will be paid during the 1918 season to all growers who have contracted their produce at lower prices, and to those who shall hereafter make contracts.

L. J. SIMPSON SEEKS OFFICE OF GOVERNOR

L. J. Simpson of North Bend, Oregon, has announced himself as a candidate for nomination for governor on the republican ticket. Mr. Simpson is a man who has made good in large civic affairs and has displayed more than the usual ability as an executive. MEAT EXTENDER: TAMALE PIE

Two cups corn meal, 2½ teaspoonfuls salt, 6 cups boiling water, onion 1 tablespoonful fat, 1 pound hamburger, 2 cups tomatoes, ½ teaspoonful cayenne pepper or 1 small chopped sweet pepper. This will serve six people.

RICE BREAD

For one loaf. Use white sponge, 1½ cup of cooked rice and enough white flour to make stiff.



STANDARD CAKE

¼ cup erisco, 1 cup Karo, 2 eggs, ½ cup (scant) milk, 1¾ flour, ¼ teaspoonful soda, 2 teaspoonfuls baking powder, ½ teaspoonful flavoring, ¼ teaspoon-salt; ¾ hour to bake in gas oven.
