NEW STATE LAWS EFFECT RURAL SCHOOLS

At the meeting of the County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations at Fairview on Saturday, there were present Mrs. E. J. Stack, president; Mrs. J. Lynch, vice president; eight presidents of local circles; ten teachers from adjoining districts and a large number of members.

Mrs. John Jonas, a member of the Fairview school board, welcomed the Council in a few well-chosen words. All the presidents reported on their work. Nearly all are active in helping the Industrial club work in the schools. Mrs. Aristene Felts, the well-known club woman, was present and spoke briefly along the same line.

Mrs. L. A. Harlow, Mrs. C. I. Raker and Mrs. Janet Grant were appointed to draft resolutions of condolence on the death of Miss Geraldine Alderson, daughter of the county superintendent of schools.

Following the program, an excellent program of music and readings was rendered, as announced in the last Outlook. State Superintendent of Instruction Churchill was introduced and spoke on what Oregon is doing to raise the standard of rural schools. Mr. Churchill referred to two laws which will have far-reaching effects on the rural schools. One is the law making an eight-months school year compulsory, which is said to be the longest compulsory school year in any state. The law is already in effect. The other is on the statute books and will go into effect in the coming fall, and provides that all teachers shall have at least two years' training in a normal school. Mr. Churchill spoke briefly in regard to standardization and consolidation of schools in small districts.

NUT LOAF

1 cup ground English walnuts; 1 cup mashed potatoes; 1 cup dry bread crumbs; 1/2 cup milk; 2 eggs. Mix all. Shape into loaf. Bake thirty minutes. Serve with tomato sauce.



CORNMEAL MUSH BREAD

Use white sponge 1 1/2 cups cornmeal mush and enough white flour to make stiff.

SALMON LOAF

1 can salmon (or other kind fish); 1 cup fine stale bread crumbs; 1 egg; 3 tablespoons melted butter or drippings; salt, pepper, minced parsley; 1/2 cup milk (about).

SAUCE FOR ABOVE

1 cup sweet milk; 1 tablespoon corn starch; 1 tablespoon butter or drippings; liquor of fish; 1 egg; juice of 1 lemon.
