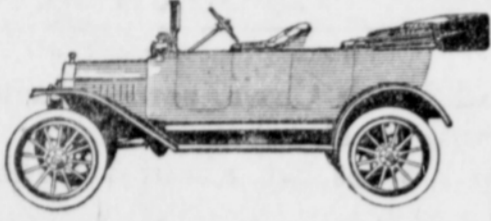

ASTORIA MAYOR URGES OREGON COAST DEFENSE

Mayor F. C. Harley, of Astoria, who has been spending some time in Washington, under date of February 25th issues a letter to the citizens of Oregon assuring them that so far as their backing is concerned the committee has been doing good work and the campaign has been crowned with success.

Harley says: "As chairman of that committee, and as mayor of Astoria I have been in constant touch with the situation. I know the difficulties that have been met and overcome, the chief of which has been lethargy, and in two conspicuous cases the hostility of the Oregon delegation in congress. Added to this has been the selfish attitude of certain property owners of Astoria who have sought, in the final stages of the campaign, to hold up the government on the price of the site selected by the commission on naval yards and naval stations.

"It gives me no little pride to report to the people of Oregon that the main contentions which I held in this matter have been confirmed by the report of the commission which was presented to congress in a message from the president on May 28, 1917. These contentions were, first, the need for recognition of the mouth of the Columbia river as the site for a government naval base (an aviation station has been included in the report); and second, the sum of \$60,000 as the price to be paid for the site selected as against \$75,000 asked by the owners, with the recommendation that the government acquire by condemnation.

"The commission's recommendation was clear cut. It stated that the commission was impressed with the importance of adequately defending this region (the valley of the Columbia) from hostile attack, and establishing, if possible, near the mouth of the Columbia, submarine and aviation base from which operations could be conducted in time of war. It recommended the acquisition and development of Tongue Point as the most suitable for these purposes."

"So far as the report is concerned," says Mr. Harley, "the way is clear for the appropriation necessary to secure this desired improvement. But Secretary Daniels has just stated to congress that he will not recommend appropriations for additional naval bases on the Pacific coast at this session. It is therefore clearly up to the Oregon delegation and their colleagues of the Pacific coast states to impress congress with the necessity of doing this work now. It will take active, energetic work."

"The Pacific coast should be adequately equipped at once for naval defense. It is not anticipated that the scene of naval operations will shift to the Pacific during the current war, but there is a possibility, and no chances should be taken," says Mr. Harley.

"The time to strike is now. I am still willing to push on this matter and purpose to do all in my power to get immediate results. The people of Oregon should urge upon their senators and representative vigorous action. They should not be allowed to sleep on the job. Unless they are prodded, I fear they will be heard snoring."

WHAT THE WAR DID FOR HARRY LAUDER

It has been the privilege of many in this locality to have heard Harry Lauder on his recent visit to Portland or on former occasions. All who have admired him in the past are now the more strongly drawn to him on account of his courage in putting aside his grief over the death of his son in order to bring pleasure to other soldier boys. Harry Lauder is quoted as saying:

"While the grief and pain had been blinding my eyes, God had been waiting patiently for the first sharp agony to pass away, and when it did he gently lifted the veil from my eyes and showed me the promised land beyond. I mean that suddenly I realized I had not seen the last of John, and that we were sure to meet in another world.

"Oh, that I could convey to you the healing balm that that thought was to my soul! I would that I could picture to you the joy of the thought that I was to see my John again at some future date, just as if he had simply gone on a long journey, and was waiting for his mother and me to come to him. And I brought his image before me, and imagined him holding out his arms to his mother and myself to fold us within his loving embrace, and in the joy created by that picture I was able to assuage some of my pain and distress, and return to an almost normal state of mind.

"And because of the great comfort that my belief and faith in the future life have brought me, I have become humbly grateful and thankful that I never mocked and thanked God for my son! I would that I could picture to you the joy of the thought that I was to see my John again at some future date, just as if he had simply gone on a long journey, and was waiting for his mother and me to come to him. And I brought his image before me, and imagined him holding out his arms to his mother and myself to fold us within his loving embrace, and in the joy created by that picture I was able to assuage some of my pain and distress, and return to an almost normal state of mind.

"And that is what every American father and mother who loses a son must do—have strong unbreakable faith in the future life, in the world beyond, where you will see your son once again. Do not give way to grief as I did. Instead, keep your gaze and your faith fixed on the world beyond, and regard your boy's

absence as though he were but on a long journey. By keeping your faith you will help win the war. For if you lose it, the war and your own personal self are lost."

Harry Lauder has a message to "the fathers and mothers, sisters and brothers of America." It ends with these words:

"We are making a new world. Let the failures of the past be our great example for the future rejuvenation.

"We must not leave a stone unturned to put this right. The world is on fire, and our soldiers are the firemen who are called upon to put the fire out. We must not leave a smoldering spark. The hellish fire of vandalism, murder, plunder, must be stamped out.

"When you get to France, and put it out, do not leave a wee bit of red smoldering. Put it out clean. You are going to light up civilization. You boys are the lamp-lighters of the world. You are going to light it up as never before, and let me tell you it will be very beautiful for your children to be able to say 'My dad lit that lamp.'

"Never mind the peace cranks. I have been to the front, and that's where the fighting is done. They never talk about peace there. Nobody there says, 'When are we going to have peace?' At the front they say, 'When are we going to have the next push.'

"They said to me, 'Harry, if you ever hear anybody talking about peace when you get home, swipe their feet from under them.' The brawny, tawny hand of Great Britain is ready for you, boys. I was in London when the first contingent of American doctors and nurses came in, and I tell you we gave them a reception. We are all in the great melting pot together, and we are going to emerge a stronger and better civilization."

Country Boys Not Physically Superior.

According to records of the selective service, country boys do not show much physical superiority over those of the cities. For purpose of comparison selection was made of cities of 40,000 to 500,000 population, and a corresponding set of counties of the same total size. In the physical examinations 28.47 per cent of the city boys were rejected, as against 27.96 per cent of the country boys.
