A Splendid Record Achieved.

H. W. Snashall, president of the Farmers Mutual Fire Relief Association, reports the association has broken all former records in 1917. The annual statement shows 383 new members gained, 17 fire losses paid, aggregating \$4911; \$1,036,677 of insurance written, one assessment levied, and \$700 invested in liberty bonds during the year. The association is entering its 14th year, and has over 4000 members carrying \$4,250,000 insurance. It has made an annual saving of over 50 per cent to its members. PATRIOTIC PROGRAM AT PLEASANT VALLEY

The regular meeting of the Red Cross on last Monday evening was well attended, and the following program was highly complimented by all who attended: duet, "Joan of Arc," Florence Richey and Mrs. J. S. Donaldson. A quartet from the Franklin High school sang "Keep the Home Fires Burning" and other patriotic selections. Recitation, "Keep on Knitting," Mildred Easley; recitation, "Trying to Whip the Professor," Albert Troge; instrumental selection, "Glories of Patriotism," Hazel Bliss; reading by T. Berry, chairman of the auxiliary; address, "The Relation of Local Government to National Government," County Commissioner Holman. Mr. Holman was unanimously elected as a nominee for county commissioner to succeed himself. When he finished his address we all wished we were entitled to enough votes to elect him, as his plan of having the county cooperate with the government in all ways and not appropriating money on unnecessary road and construction work during the period of the war met with the approval of all present. We need loyal and patriotic men such as Mr. Holman at the head of county affairs. The people will do well to re-elect him. Principal R. H. Searle read a letter from C. S. Jackson, editor of the Oregon Journal, stating a 7x14 flag was being sent to the Pleasant Valley school for being the first school in the state to go over the top in selling war saving stamps—\$20 or more in sales for each pupil of school age in the district.
