CORPORAL FRANK G. BELL LIKES WORK IN FRANCE

Corporal Frank G. Bell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grant Bell of Springfield, has written his parents of his experiences driving trucks in connection with an engineer's corps in France. His letter is dated February 9, 1918. In it he says in part:
"I got your letter dated December 7 day before yesterday, so you see it takes just about two months to get mail. We have moved so many times since we got to France that I have nearly lost track of them. We drive the trucks overland when we move, and, believe me, it is some sport. The trips we have taken have been from two to five days in length, so you may know we have seen a lot of France already. We stay at hotels on the way and it seems more like a pleasure trip than war. But I suppose we will see war quick enough anyway.
"I haven't learned to talk much in French yet but am learning slowly. I think the people seem to be very fine and seem to be well educated. The country is just grand. We stopped and saw many old castles and one in particular was built in the twelfth century. We went all through it and it certainly was great.
"We are living in good barracks now, on the outskirts of a city about the size of Portland. The prices here are about the same as they are there for nearly everything. I got my first Christmas present yesterday from Lena and Rudolph, a nice book.
"I think I will have to take the band to town this afternoon as they are going to give a concert in the park. We have the best band you ever heard. Forest Jenne has been transferred from my company and I have lost track of him completely.
"If you don't hear from me as often as you think you ought to don't worry, because I am feeling fine and am so busy I don't have time to get home-sick or write letters even, as I have to work nearly every Sunday as we don't have enough trucks to do the work, but we are going to get more soon."
In a former letter Corporal Bell wrote his brother that he was mighty glad he did not chew or smoke, as tobacco was almost impossible to get over there.
