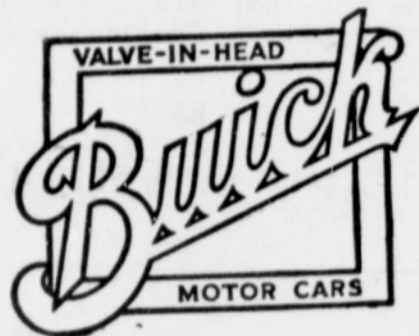

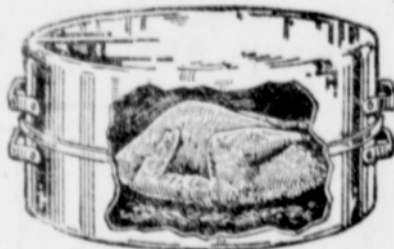

BROWN WINS LAWSUIT AGAINST LATOURELL'S

The trial of Brown vs. Latourell & Son, in which John Brown sued the latter for a commission of \$290, was tried in Judge Gaten's court on Tuesday and resulted in a verdict for Brown. The verdict of the jury was reached in twenty minutes and was for the full amount sued for.

The case was based upon the agreement entered into between Charles Latourell and Brown for the sale of the personal property lease and agency of the Ford garage in Gresham. There was only a verbal contract, and when Mr. Brown brought a customer, the Latourells refused to pay the commission. The suit was won on the grounds that a written contract is not necessary for anything except real estate and that a verbal agreement is all that is necessary for a chattel transfer.

The jury that tried the case consisted of twelve entire strangers to either party and was headed by S. J. Cochran as foreman. The others were John A. Colyas, J. C. Burris, Herman Vetter, Louis Judkins, Otto A. Bohlman, Henry V. Ordway, C. L. Hollopeter, Adam Kischner, James O'Brien, J. C. Morris and J. A. Workman.

The plaintiff introduced no evidence, depending on the pleadings for their testimony. Milo C. King was Brown's attorney, the defendants being represented by Schneider & McGuirk.

county announced that they were compelled to give up their fight to beat the prohibition law, and for the first time in years all of these notorious roadhouses are closed permanently.

As chairman of the Multnomah county exemption board he has given many hours of his time, both day and night, to this patriotic work. He is likewise commander-in-chief of the Multnomah Guards, an organization of Portland business men who are giving gratuitously of their time to guard the business and industrial interests along the water front, and who are always ready for any call for the protection of life and property in the county.

JOHN BROWN IS NAMED TO REGISTER VOTERS

John Brown has been appointed deputy registrar for the county precincts with office in Gresham in the Regner building, on Main street, and will attend to the wishes of the voters from 9 to 12 a. m. He has been supplied with necessary maps, cards, etc., and appointed especially for the following precincts:

Fairview, 205; Rockwood, 306; Sycamore, 307; S. Gresham, 308; W. Gresham, 309; E. Gresham, 309 1/2; Troutdale, 310; Powell Valley, 311; Pleasant Home, 311 1/2. Also any others in county precincts east of Portland. All registering must be done by March 31, so as to give the county registrar time to record and correct any changes.

Any person who has registered and voted in any of the last two elections and is living in the same precinct need not apply.

Any one failing to vote at the last two elections must register anew.

Any persons changing from one precinct to another must have their registration changed so as to save confusion at the polls and to entitle them to vote.

Any one, male or female, arriving at maturity—21 years of age—is entitled to register.

Any person of foreign birth must present his final citizenship papers to the registrar or deputy.

Any American-born woman who has married a man of foreign birth must present her husband's full citizenship papers.

Any foreign-born woman marrying an American-born man does not need any paper to register.
