

GRESHAM LOCALS

Mrs. E. E. Johnson of Columbia City visited on Wednesday with her brother, D. S. Johnson and wife.

John Brown filed his petition today with the county clerk, asking the voters to name him as the candidate for justice of the peace on the republican ticket for Multnomah district.

Constable M. M. Squire filed his nominating petition yesterday to succeed himself as constable of Multnomah district, which comprises all of the county east of the Portland city limits.

B. L. Walrad left Gresham last night for Colville, Wash., having been called for by a telegram informing him of the serious illness of his stepfather. He will probably be gone a week.

At the Gresham Baptist church next Sunday, the Sunday school will meet at 10 o'clock followed by morning worship led by Rev. E. A. Leonard. In the evening at 8 o'clock, the pastor, Rev. A. J. Ware will preach. All are welcome.

Miss Florence Rosin was elected Queen of May by the students of the Union High school at an election held this morning. Miss Rosin is from Pleasant Valley district No 15 J. Five candidates competed for the honor. Enthusiastic plans are already under way for the celebration of May day, which will be an attractive festival. All departments of the school will be represented by drills and student activities.

O. Andrews of Anderson station brought to the Gresham library yesterday three boxes of choice books and magazines, aggregation 250 pounds in weight. They are to be distributed among the soldiers and sailors in training camps and cantonments. The books cover a wide range of subjects and are in three languages, English, Norwegian and Swedish. Mr. Andrews, who is an old sailor, has a sextant which he will donate to the government for use in the navy.

COUNTRY DISTRICTS WILL GIVE SIXTEEN

Nine hundred and twenty-three more Oregon men are to be called to the colors immediately for the National army.

They will be inducted into the military service from Class 1, in the sequence of their order numbers. Orders have been received from the War department by the Adjutant General of Oregon that all these men must be entrained for Camp Lewis, Wash., in the five day period beginning April 26.

This quota of 923 men is in addition to the draft quota of 369 men who were called into service from Oregon on March 29.

The 923 men comprise 12.5 per cent of Oregon's quota in the first draft.

No county in the state will be exempted from furnishing its proportionate quota of men to meet this call.

At the same time it is announced by the War Department that each county will receive full credit on the next net draft quota for the men sent now.

Though men from Class 1 are to be inducted into service in the sequence of their order numbers, the calling of men actively, completely and assiduously engaged in the planting and cultivation of farm crops, by direction of the President, will be deferred until the end of the new quota.

Portland will be called upon for 279 men—ten divisions—and the county of Multnomah outside of Portland will give sixteen.

Miss Pearl Durst of the Gresham branch library has received a message from the main library today to the effect that the Portland library has done more work in the way of the collection of books and magazines for the soldiers and in the sale of war savings stamps and in other ways, than any other library in the United States. The information comes through Mr. Utley, secretary of the American Library association. This is but another evidence of the way in which Oregon goes over the top.
