WAR WORK FOR TEACHERS DURING SUMMER SESSION

How to supervise war emergency food production and conservation will be the principal work of the 1918 summer sessions of O. A. C., June 10 to July 20. Teachers, and especially women teachers, will be trained in directing the work of poultry raising, gardening and growing farm crops.

DIPPING POTATOES INCREASES YIELD

To control the diseases that lower both yield and quality of the potato crop in Oregon it is necessary to do four things—rotate the soil, select the seed and disinfect it, spray the vines, and store the crop so as to hold the storage roots in check.

All of these are essential to control of disease, but the one calling for most careful attention just now is that of seed treatment, described as follows by the O. A. C. Plant Pathologists: Take four ounces of mercuric chloride, powdered or crystalline, (which may be bought at the local drug store) and dissolve it in one quart of hot water.

Other war work of the summer session will be commercial training for men and women in lines called for by the civil service branch of government. Notwithstanding the volumes of publicity calling for stenographers, typewriters and office assistants, it has been impossible to meet the demand.
