### CLACKAMAS FAIR CUTS OUT RACING PROGRAM

According to a recent statement of O. E. Freytag, of Gladstone, secretary and manager of the Clackamas county fair, the horse-racing at the fair this fall will be nil.

The annual exhibition at Canby has long held these stirring events, and one of the best half mile tracks in the state is on the grounds. However, in order to offset any adverse effects from the discontinuance of the racing program, Secretary Freytag announces that the prizes on agriculture and stock exhibits will be doubled, and that the sports and contests arranged for will be of such a nature as to provide pleasure and amusement for all those attending the fair.

Grant B. Dimick has been re-elected president of the fair board, and C. N. Wait, vice-president and W. H. Bair, treasurer, were also re-instated as officers. The county commissioners are ex-officio members of the board.

The Oregon City Courier says that Mrs. C. E. Spence, wife of the master of the state grange, of Beaver Creek, has donated a pedigreed Jersey calf, one month old, to the local Red Cross auxiliary. The calf will be raffled off, and chances are being sold at a dollar apiece, with the "sky the limit."

At the recent Liberty Day League meetings at Beaver Creek, over sixty calves were sold, and it is expected that a goodly sum will be realized. The grandmother of the animal was purchased by the Spences from the Ladd estate in Portland, when two weeks old, for \$100. The mother has been raised on the Spence ranch at Beaver Creek, and the father is a registered animal of the Matthews herd.

The lucky winner of the fine young bovine will have the pedigree papers transferred to him when the results are made known. The stock is unusually good and the Beaver Creek Red Cross will gain a new impetus when the proceeds of the raffle are added to their funds.

In Norway, where no gasoline obtainable for many months and automobiles have practically ceased running, experiments are being made to operate motor cars with acetylene gas.
