SUGAR FOR CANNING IS FULLY ASSURED

Oregon housewives need have no further anxiety as to whether there will be a sufficient supply of sugar for the canning and preserving of fruits during the coming season. Provision has been made, Federal Food Administrator W. B. Ayer announces, for an ample supply of sugar for this purpose, and instructions as to the distribution of sugar for canning are now in the hands of all retailers in the state.

"Sugar for canning purposes will be issued under a certificate system" said Mr. Ayer. "Each purchaser must sign an official certificate with each purchase, setting forth the amount and date of purchase and attesting that the sugar will be used for this purpose only; also that she will limit the use of sugar in her household for all other purposes, to three pounds per month per person. Each retailer will keep a check upon his customers, to prevent misuse or abuse of the certificate privilege, and all certificates will be returned to the Food Administration, where they will be rechecked. Under this system it will be impossible for any purchaser to buy an unreasonable amount of sugar without prompt detection."

FUEL SECRETS WILL NOT HAVE TO BE TOLD

As a result of strong representations by Fuel Administrator Holmes of Oregon, fuel consumers of the state will not be compelled to make written application for wood and coal supplies, as previously announced.

Holmes took the stand that Oregonians are being encouraged to lay in ample supplies early, and he considered that enforcement of the application blank order was an unnecessary inconvenience to the public and a useless expense to fuel dealers.

He laid his case before the National Fuel administration and has just received a wire from Washington stating that a special ruling will be made for Oregon, although the regulation will be enforced in all other states, saving possibly other northwestern states.

Advices from Washington to Holmes indicates that conditions point to another fuel shortage this coming winter unless consumers lay in their supplies now. The congested condition of the transportation system is compelling slow movement in this regard.

DEFERRED CLASSIFICATION

The U. S. Government has made deferred classification possible to competent skilled farm workers in order to keep a supply of laborers in the agricultural field, and requests that farmers take advantage of it immediately in order to keep up the maximum production. The local draft boards cannot defer the call of such men unless the farmers employing them give affidavits supporting their claims for such classification. Those wishing deferred classification are urged to act promptly and file affidavits immediately with the local boards. The rules governing same and other information concerning this may be obtained at the Agricultural office.

It is the plan of the Government to call the men in the second draft in small groups distributing the burden over the various states so as to interfere as little as possible with industry and agriculture.
