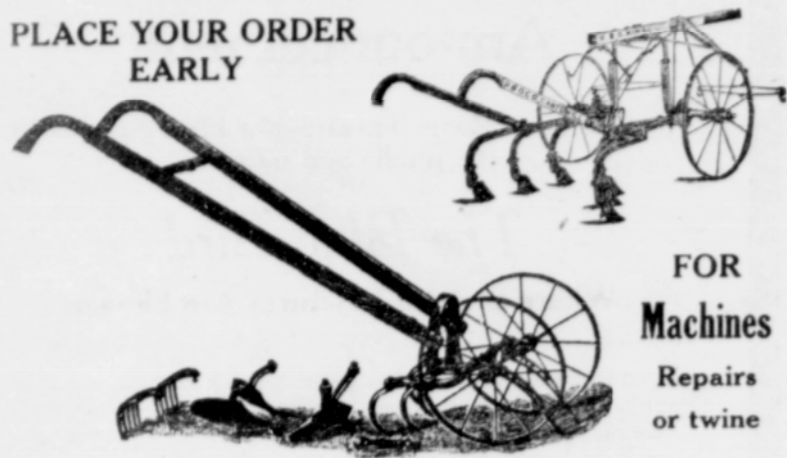

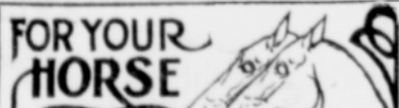

PLANS IN EMBRYO FOR MEMORIAL DAY

A special meeting of the Gresham city council was held last night upon a call by Mayor Kenney, the object being to formulate plans for the proper observance of Memorial Day. There were a few suggestions as to what form the exercises should take but no definite plan was decided upon. It was finally determined to adjourn until Thursday evening of this week when another meeting will be held to which all those interested are invited so that a full expression may be had and the proper committees appointed.

FAIL TO REGISTER AND GO TO PRISON

Wednesday, June 5, has been officially designated as Registration Day throughout the United States, for all young men who have attained the age of 21 years since draft Registration day one year ago.

On Wednesday, June 5, every 21-year old man in the United States must appear at the registration place designated by his local draft board, and register.

The only exceptions are men already in military or naval service. Special arrangements have been made whereby absentees and those too ill to appear at the registration places, may register by mail.

But they must all register. Failure to do so makes the guilty young man liable to imprisonment for one year. And ignorance of the fact that June 5 is Registration Day will not be accepted as a excuse. The burden of informing themselves as to the place and date of registration is placed on the men themselves.

Registration will be in charge of the local boards in their respective districts. They are required to post immediately a list of the registration places.

These registration places will be open from 7 o'clock the morning of June 5 until 9 o'clock that night. They will be in charge of officials of the local draft boards.

June 5 has been selected as the date for Registration Day because it is the anniversary of the first draft Registration Day, when approximately 10,000,000 men between the ages of 21 and 30 years, inclusive, registered for the draft.

This Registration Day is only for men who have reached the age of 21 years, thus coming within the draft age, since last Registration Day.

I saw a show in the New National theater here at which President Wilson paid \$1000 for his seat. Standing room on the first floor sold for \$3 and some people were turned down. One of the programs which had all the signatures of the players was auctioned for \$1000. The funds were turned over to the Red Cross. This was supposed to be one of the greatest plays ever played in Washington.

I was more than satisfied with my position. It is auditor in Treasury Department. I have to verify accounts and place them in their final file. I have no shorthand or typing. The only trouble with this city is that it is so over-crowded with people and they are calling for more.

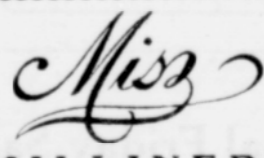

GET YOUR TRANSFER TO THE MARINE CORPS

In order that every man between the ages of 18 and 36 years of age, either married or single, may have the opportunity of enlisting in the United States Marine Corps, every postmaster in Oregon has been authorized to examine, accept and transfer men for this excellent branch of American service, which is named in the same breath with the Foreign Legion of France, the Texas Rangers, Northwest Mounted Police and the Pennsylvania State Constabulary.
Marines are specially trained, splendidly equipped and fight as Artillery, Infantry, Cavalry, Signalmen, Aviators and in any manner that necessity or the occasion demands. In recognition of their splendid record in the past and their excellent achievements in the present struggle for democracy, Congress has authorized the increasing of the corps to 75,000 men in order that they may take over and maintain a separate section of trenches in France.

United States marines wear a separate and distinctive uniform from either the army or navy. They also have their own corps device which consists of an anchor, globe and eagle, and is worn on the hat, cap or helmet of the marine. It is by this small device that the marine is readily distinguished from all other branches of service.

Registered and unregistered men between the above mentioned ages who are desirous of enlisting may do so. Registered men must furnish a statement from their local board that they are not needed to fill the current quota of the draft and that permission has been granted for their enlistment in the marines. A married man must have a written consent from his wife that she consents to his enlistment. Your postmaster will gladly assist you in obtaining your release from the local board and will also explain this splendid branch of service. Ask him today.
