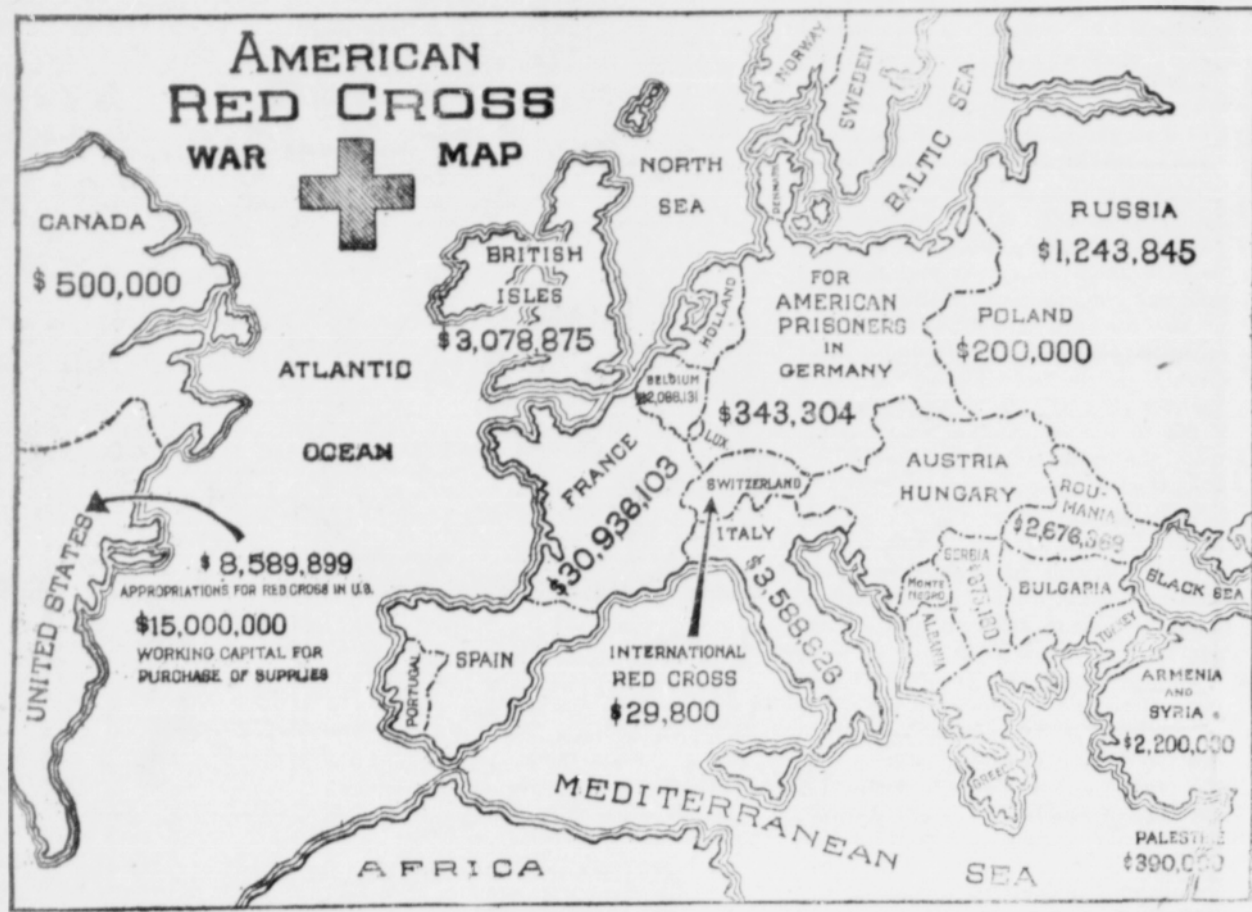


THIS MAP SHOWS HOW YOUR RED CROSS DOLLAR WAS SPENT

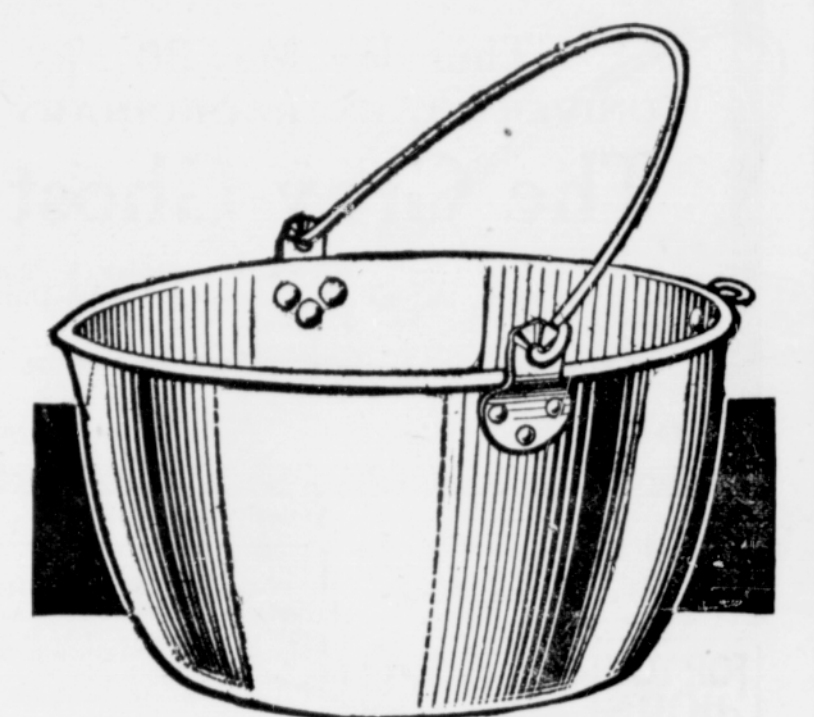

CABBAGE ENEMIES AND OTHER INSECT PESTS

This little insect exacts a heavy toll each year from practically every home or commercial garden in this section of the country. Its habits and life history are such that it is rather difficult to control. The fly deposits the eggs upon the ground near the cabbage or radish plant. The eggs hatch in a short time and the little white worm finds its way to the plant where it feeds usually below the surface of the ground until it becomes full grown and goes into the resting stage to again hatch out as a fly to lay more eggs. The winter is usually spent in either the grub stage or the resting stage in the ground around the roots of the cabbage, kale, radish, turnip, mustard, or other plants of the same family; so to destroy all such rubbish and plow the ground deep rather early will help to destroy a large percentage of the insects.

The best way to combat these insects is to grow radishes and cabbage plants under a cheese cloth screen. This can be easily arranged by making a frame of one foot boards set edge-wise and covering the top with light cheese cloth or mosquito bar. This will keep the flies away from the plants and will not cut off enough sunlight to hamper the growth of the plants.

After the plants are set in the fields the most effective way to keep the worms off is the use of the tar paper disc. This is a piece of tar paper 4 or 5 inches in diameter with a slit cut to the center where there should be a small hole to admit the stalk of the plant. This is placed about the stalk of the plant and smooth with the surface of the ground. The young worms will not crawl over this to reach the plant.

There are several things which will serve a partial control. These consist of materials and spray which can be placed on the ground about the plant to repel the fly and keep them from laying the eggs. Frequent cultivation close to the plants serve the same purpose and should not be overlooked as a control method. Some of these repellants which have been reported as fairly effective are ashes, air slaked lime, sheep dip spray and liquid manure.

It is also your business to see that there are no thistles in your vicinity allowed to go to seed.
