Reports from Y. M. C. A. centers in France state that most American soldiers are sending money home as well as carrying insurance and making payments on liberty bonds.

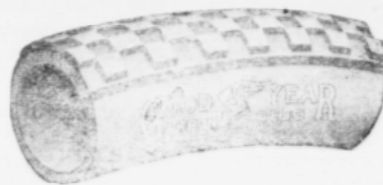
#### To Live Clean Lives.

### DAVIS' FAIRVIEW STORE NOW IN CITY BUILDING

An adjustment of the fire losses sustained by J. M. Davis, proprietor of the store at Fairview burned last week, has been made. A policy for \$2500 was held in the Grange which had been renewed but a few weeks ago. It did not cover the total loss, but some of the effects were saved, thus reducing the losses.

Mr. Davis has taken up temporary quarters in the empty store room in the city hall building and may continue there permanently. He feels particularly grateful to the Gresham Volunteer fire department for its help and to all others who gave assistance at the time of the fire. It is reported that the loss on the stock was about \$1000. The building was totally destroyed. It was a large building of two stories, and was formerly known as the Artisan hall.

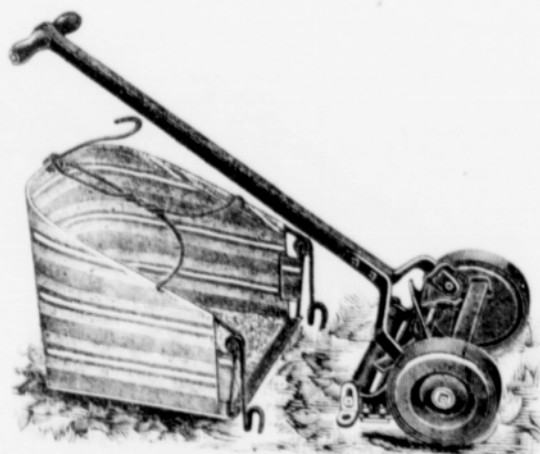
