By attention to field conservation Oregon wheat growers may save themselves money as well as conserve more than a million bushels of wheat.

Grow non-shattering varieties and harvest before unduly ripe. Adjust and run the harvesting machinery to take up all the grain, and the threshers to get and save as much as possible.

The loss of grain due to these causes probably amounts to more than 600,000 bushels per year in Oregon. Careful and frequent inspection of the work of farmers and machine operators will reduce this loss to a minimum.
