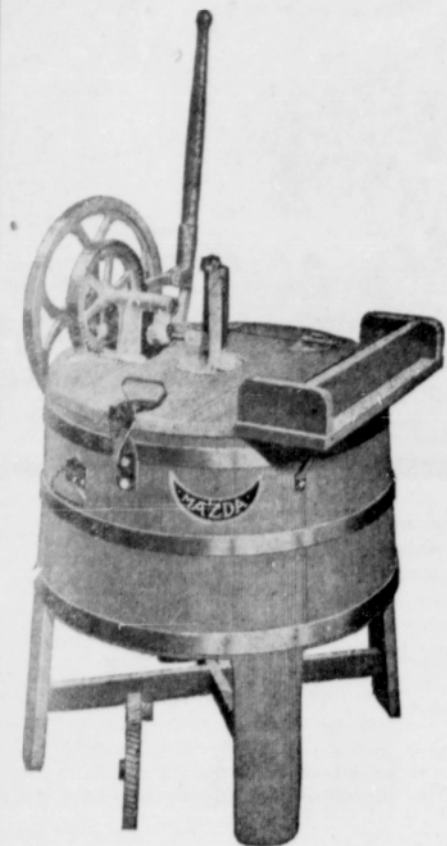

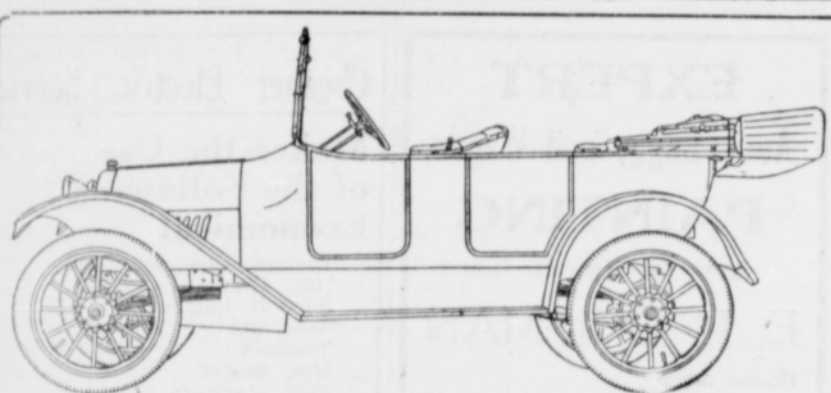

Mrs. J. W. Hendricks has given the Outlook a letter for publication from her son Curtis, who is now serving with his regiment at the front. In presenting the letter Mrs. Hendricks says, "The enclosed cheery letter came this week, and as I love to read all of the hopeful letters written by the boys, I imagine the rest of the mothers do also. Curtis was evidently about to move forward, for the same message of 'Don't worry, Mother, he has never failed to send me when his journey is resumed. Isn't it grand that our noble boys can go forward like that?' The letter, which was written on May 15th, follows:

Your welcome letter and the box you spoke of came yesterday. I am glad Oregon was the first to subscribe to her quota of liberty bonds. I believe Oregon will always be first when it comes to matters of national importance.

Today was really the first good day we have had for a month. It was certainly lovely. Not a cloud in the sky and O so warm. Everything is green and fresh looking here and very beautiful. It gives promise of excellent crops this year if good weather holds out.

Now Mother, I don't want you to worry a bit. I am just as safe and contented and in better health than when I left the States.

I am glad to hear that you bought some liberty bonds. I have \$150 in bonds which will be paid for in July. Then I intend, if the opportunity offers, to take out three more.

He has long been uncertain as to the fate of his near relatives but fears they have perished.
