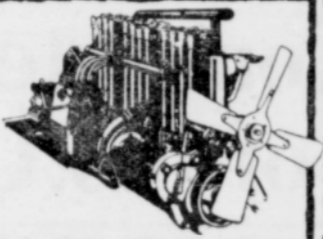

**A WAR EXPOSITION ON PACIFIC COAST**

San Francisco, June 20.—Under the direction of Arthur Bennett of the Committee on Public Information, assisted by Lieutenant Martin, representing the Canadian government, a great \$50,000 war exposition is being made ready in this city to be opened under the auspices of the Associated Advertising clubs of the World, whose annual convention is to be July 7 to 11. The war exposition, advertising the war to America, will continue in San Francisco for two weeks, being brought here from Boston after its first run. It is to be directed by the Committee on Public Information.

This same Government committee will have Chairman George Creel as its spokesman on the program of the convention of the Associated Advertising clubs, in a war advertising session arranged by William H. Johns, head of the United States Division of Advertising.

In addition to the war thrills created by air battles, tank attacks, flame assaults, trench warfare, and various combat and training camp activities demonstrated by thousands of soldiers and sailors, the war exposition will spread the War Savings Stamps doctrine by issuing a 25-cent War Thrift stamp in folder to each ticket-holder.

Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur is to speak for the Federal Food Administration in a session of the Associated Advertising Clubs convention given to "War Fundamentals—Funds, Fuel, Food." Official spokesmen for the Treasury and the Fuel Administration will offer interpretative messages on war topics. The war tinge and the war service purpose run through the entire program of the Associated Advertising Clubs' convention, from Secretary of the Interior Lane's opening address to the "Voice of Victory" patriotic rally in which representatives of the allies will participate.

Remember that National War Savings Day is June 28. Pledge yourself on or before that day to save to the utmost of your ability and to buy War Savings Stamps that there may be more money, labor and materials to back up those who fight and die for you.

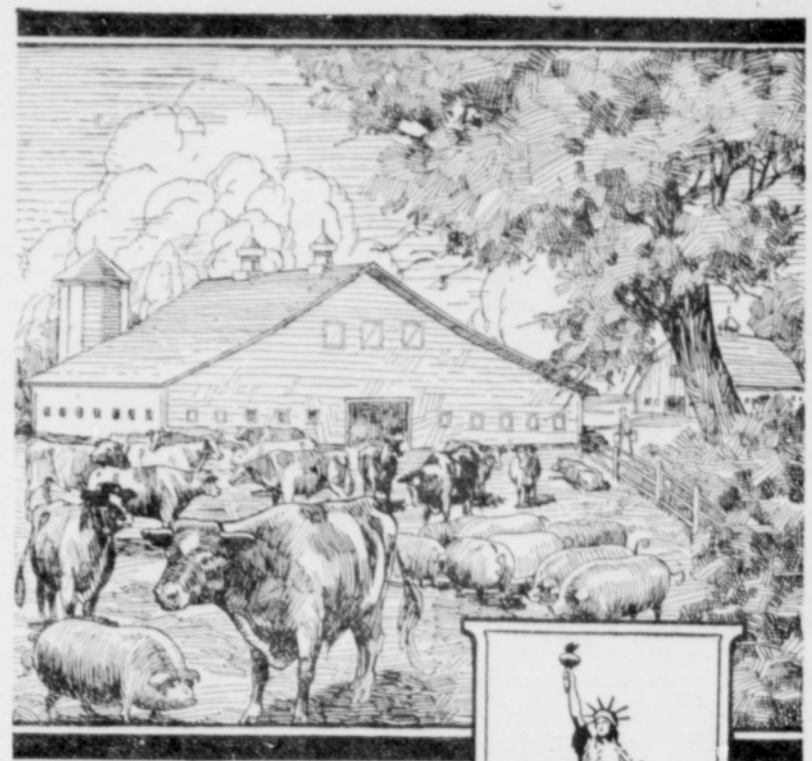
