S. mass meeting at the Kelso schoolhouse Friday evening, June 28th, by order of the Government. The roll of all citizens will be called and those not present must send a valid excuse.

To appreciate the splendid spirit of our boys at the front, one should read "The Glory of the Trenches" by Coningsby Dawson and "Letters and Diary" of Alan Seeger. In this diary written during the summer of 1915 we find this, "Never have I regretted doing what I am doing nor would I at this moment be anywhere else than where I am. I pity the poor civilians who shall never have seen or known the things that we have seen and known. Nothing but good can befall the soldier, so he plays his part well."
