## COMMUNITY ADVERTISING IS GREAT LESSON FOR ALL WHO WOULD ATTRACT ATTENTION

"A lesson in community advertising that southern California ought to heed," is what the Los Angeles Examiner calls the campaign for Washington, Oregon and British Columbia that the Pacific Northwest Tourist association is carrying on in eastern newspapers this summer with money appropriated by the legislatures of the Province and the two states. The Examiner in a quarter-page editorial exhorts Californians to do likewise.

"The advertising is tactful and certain to be result-producing," declares the Examiner. "It follows the line of least resistance by very properly calling attention to its acknowledgedly great war work and then referring incidentally to its attractions to the Americans and Canadians who need recuperation from the fatigues incident to the stress of the world crisis.

"This is a distinct lesson to southern California. It also is doing its share to help win the war, through bond-buying, Red Cross giving, through shipbuilding, through great productions of grain, hay, fruits and vegetables. And likewise, southern California furnishes an appropriate resting place for the tired, to the end that they may, reinvigorated, continue their labors for the common good."

Most communities in Oregon, Washington and British Columbia, "Our International Playground," would be ready with an answer to the following questions asked by the Examiner concerning southern California: "In the summer time where else is to be found our congenial sun that never becomes oppressive because of the air's dryness? Where else, unless it is in high mountain

fastness, does one always need a blanket at night while sleeping?"

The Examiner highly commends Herbert Cuthbert, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Tourist association, for the planning of the campaign.

"We understand," says the Examiner writer, "that this advertising has been arranged through joint action of representative men and commercial organizations of British Columbia, Washington and Oregon. This is done on the accurate assumption that if a visitor goes to the Northwest he will take in all the points of interest, or that if he settles for a time in any one place the entire region will be benefited; furthermore, that while one community might find an adequate advertising campaign in its own interest too burdensome, it can get equally good results for itself if it makes common cause with adjacent communities, even if some of them are in a neighboring and friendly country.

"This advertising is being done in newspapers published in localities presumably interested just now in the Northwest's attractions. Its main purpose is to tell the world that 'the Pacific Northwest is helping to whip the Huns.' It cites its lumber production for building aeroplanes, its shipbuilding for allied needs, its big consignments of fish, grain and fruit, and lastly 'its big national parks and playgrounds in which the men and women of two nations may recuperate and renew their vitality for their big war service.' Then the advertisement explains that booklets on fishing, golfing, mountaineering, yachting and automobileing in the Northwest may be had from any of the civic bodies of the Pacific Northwest."
