#### HOW TO PICK BARTLETS FOR THE BEST RESULTS

When the picking season starts, it is important that the entire crop of Bartlett pears to be shipped fresh and handled as rapidly as possible, points out C. I. Lewis, J. R. Magness and C. C. Cate of the Oregon Agricultural college Experiment Station, in Bulletin No. 154 just off the press, a "Preliminary Report of Pear Harvesting and Storage Investigations in Rogue River Valley."

From the standpoint of best keeping quality, there is no advantage in making two pickings, according to these authorities. Late picking if shipped fresh should be sent into markets as close as possible to the source of shipment.

If part of the crop is to be sent to a cannery, it is well to remove the large pears at the time of sending out the first shipments, then leave the others on the trees two to four weeks. They will gain greatly in size during such a period.

For varieties other than Bartlett, there is little danger of leaving the fruit on the trees too long except from the weather standpoint. A great increase in size can be gained by delaying picking beyond the time at which fruit is now removed, and this is important, not only because of increased total tonnage, but also because of prevailing prices for large-size fruit. A slight dropping of pears will usually be much more than overcome by the increased size of those remaining. Late pickings will also do a great deal toward insuring a high quality product on the market.

## MOVIES ON SHIPBOARD AMUSE THE SOLDIERS

Equipping American transports with motion picture machines and operators, the Y. M. C. A. has solved the problem of the leisure time of the soldiers crossing the Atlantic ocean to France. The full Y. M. C. A. program is carried out abroad the transports with war work secretaries serving the men, furnishing them with writing paper and envelopes, staging entertainments and looking after their physical, moral and educational needs.

The Y. M. C. A. has 3,480,000 feet of film on the high seas. Machines aboard ship are going at the same time on the upper deck, second deck and perhaps inside for the officers.

What motion pictures mean to the soldiers is shown by this incident which happened on a transport bound for France:

A serial motion picture was being shown. An alarm was given that a U-boat had been sighted. Immediately every man was on deck. A torpedo was launched but missed. The boys waited a few minutes and then one of them turned to an officer and asked, "can we go below now and finish the picture?"

Since March the Y. M. C. A. has provided 40,000 to 50,000 feet of film to each boat. The crew and soldiers enjoy them going over and the wounded coming back. Only the best films are used with Mary Pickford, Douglas Fairbanks, Wm. S. Hart and others as the stars.

## SOW RYE AND VETCH FOR WINTER USE

Much late fall and early spring pasture can be secured very economically by the practice of sowing rye and vetch in the corn fields just before the last cultivation. Where this is done the seed is ready to start with the first fall rains and as soon as the corn is cut the rye will make a very good growth and can be pastured off in the late fall and it will grow early in the spring and can either be used for pasture to plant late grain or any of the cultivated crops.

Aside from securing a goodly amount of pasture this practice will build up the fertility of the soil by preventing the plant which becomes available during the winter from being leached out of the soil and by turning under a green crop which will act as a manure to the crop which is following. Owing to the indicated high price of vetch seed rye could be sown alone this year at the rate of about 1 1/2 to 2 bushels per acre. With the prospective high price of hay and other feeds this should be worth a trial this year.

### Only Human Beings Cruel.

A cruel person is one who exults in the pain, mental or bodily, suffered by another. Cruelty has its basis in anger (and thus is related to the combative instinct) though there is a cold-blooded form of cruelty which may be enjoyed without any obtrusive feeling of anger, Henry Campbell writes in the Lancet, London.

Cruelty, implying as it does self-consciousness—the ability to realize the feelings of others—is essentially a human attribute. Children who impale frogs and eviscerate flies cannot be said to be cruel, for they know not what they do. Nor are the lower animal-cruel, seeing that they are wholly unconscious of the sufferings of others. Thus the charge of cruelty against the carnivora is unjust. These animals generally destroy their victims outright and in the rare cases (e.g., cat and mouse) where they prolong the suffering they have no knowledge of the pain they are causing. When therefore, we stigmatize the conduct of the cruel man as "brutal" we wrong the brutes.

The animal which attacks another, and in so doing causes pain, merely responds to a blind unthinking instinct; but man, proud man, who looks before and after, is able to realize and take pleasure in the pain he deliberately, and by subtle means maybe, sets out to cause. It is clearly absurd to speak of his conduct as "brutal." Rather should we call it devilish, the devil usually being credited with a goodly share of intelligence. We must cease to libel the brutes by designating the basest acts of man as brutal. As a matter of fact, they cannot be charged with nonmoral conduct, seeing that they are devoid of self-consciousness.

#### STUDENTS WARNED NOT TO BURN MIDNIGHT OIL

The supply of kerosene will run short next winter and the Government is urging every user to do his part toward making every gallon to do full war duty by giving forth its full measure of light and heat. Saving can be accomplished, it is said, only if care is given lamps, lanterns, heaters, and stoves.

The director of oil conservation of the United States Fuel administration issues these rules for fuel-oil saving:

Keep all lamps and lanterns clean. Let the light out; don't confine it behind smoked and dirty chimneys.

See that burners and wicks of all oil-burning devices are clean. Clean burners require less oil and give better lights.

Don't allow a lamp, lantern, heater, or stove to burn a minute longer than is necessary. Don't light one you can do without.

Don't use coal oil for cleaning purposes. Hot water will do the work.
