FUEL SLACKERS ARE FORTY PERCENT YET

By maintaining the present rate of fuel storage Oregonians will, for the most part, escape the rigors of the impending fuel shortage this winter insofar as householders are concerned.

This is plainly indicated by reports received by Fred J. Holmes, fuel administrator for Oregon. From all parts of the state county administrators and dealers report that the people are responding to Holmes' suggestion for early ordering.

As a result August finds fully 60 percent of the households already supplied with wood and coal or with orders in for fuel. The remaining 40 percent however, have only a short time longer to secure unlimited fuel. Moreover each day's delay, said Holmes today, increases their chances of being compelled to pay more, and at the same time shortens their chances of being able to secure supplies.

In this connection, Fuel Administrators of the army and navy, representative Garfield last week held a conference with officials of the war industries board, the shipping board, the railroad administration and reported that it was determined that war industries and the army and navy are to receive their full 100 percent fuel requirements. This will necessitate deep cuts in the quotas for households and industries not essential to war's prosecution and will also compel the diversion of western coals to eastern centers.

In the east householders in some regions are already on fuel rations, but Holmes does not believe that such drastic steps are yet necessary in Oregon. He does not intend to hold Oregonians to an arbitrary limit until he deems it necessary. When he does issue ration regulations however, they will be strictly enforced.

BATTLEFIELD DEATH TEST IS IMPORTANT

Uncertainty as to whether a person is alive or dead is specially great on the battlefield, and prompt decision in such cases is far more important than in civil life; writes a correspondent at the front. Dr. A. Terson has just recommended to the French Academy of Medicine a new test, those already known having proved insufficient. The best of these latter has been the injection of fluorescein, as devised by Icard. But even this is uncertain, for in some cases men who are still alive do not show the green coloration of the whites of their eyes following injection, which the test is supposed to produce.

Dr. Terson recommends placing in the eye a minute quantity of a 33 percent solution of dionin (ethyl-morphine) glycerine. If death has already taken place, nothing happens, but if the man has the slightest trace of life still in him the white of his eyes will immediately turn purplish red and swell, but this inflammation will disappear rapidly and leave no ill effect.

DID NOT BORROW TO BUY BONDS

The Federal Reserve Bulletin says one of the most encouraging and gratifying features of the Third Liberty Loan is that apparently there has been little use of bank accommodations of the purchase of the bonds. It estimates that probably more than 80 percent of the bonds are already fully paid for.

The financial statements of the various Federal reserve banks indicate, according to the Bulletin, that not much borrowing from the banks was done by the subscribers to the third loan. They either paid cash or bought on the installment plan.

This eases a great deal the burden of the banks, upon whose shoulders rests the financing of the business and industry of the country.

DRAFT REGULATION IS IMMENSE UNDERTAKING

In the next few days it will be necessary to begin in Oregon another intensive publicity campaign to acquaint the general public with requirements of the draft law.

This time the occasion is the lowering and raising of the draft age limits to include men from 18 to 20, inclusive, and from 32 to 44 years of age, inclusive.

Approximately 100,000 Oregon men will be affected by the new law. All these men will be required to register on a day, probably early in September, to be proclaimed by the President as soon as Congress passes the bill.

As you will readily see, this will require an immense amount of educational publicity work throughout the whole state, in order that every one of these men subject to registration will know that he must register, when he must register, where he must register, penalty for failure to register, etc.

In fact, the undertaking is a much larger one than was the case when the original registration of men from 21 to 30 years was held. The number of men to be reached and acquainted with their duties under the new law is much larger.

EXCHANGE OF LIBERTY BONDS

The issue of registered bonds of the Third Liberty Loan has progressed so far that transfers and exchanges of registered for coupon bonds will be made on and after August 1 until August 15. The registry books will be closed on the later date in order to prepare checks for interest payments on September 15. Bonds may be presented during such period for transfer or exchange, but such transaction will be effected after September 15 and the September interest paid to whom-ever was holder of the bonds on August 15.

Coupon bonds presented after August 15 for exchange for registered bonds should have the September interest coupon detached; the registered bonds issued upon such exchange will bear interest from September 15.
