Millions of Taxes to Be Voted.

The Oregonian shows that a many-million-dollar election is coming on in Oregon.

The total of money it is proposed to raise in bonds, taxes and direct appropriations in Portland alone is \$5,750,000.

Portland's individual interest in the state measures that carry appropriations or tax levies is about one-third the total sum to be raised.

For the two new normal schools \$250,000 in a lump is to be appropriated and a tax of about \$75,000 a year imposed in addition.

There is an appropriation proposal of \$200,000 to establish a home for dependent, delinquent and defective children.

From the State Tax commission comes a proposal that additional state taxes in the sum of \$340,000 be authorized by the people for emergency work and expenses.

The voter who thinks he can safely trust his interests to others in the forthcoming election needs to study the foregoing statement.
