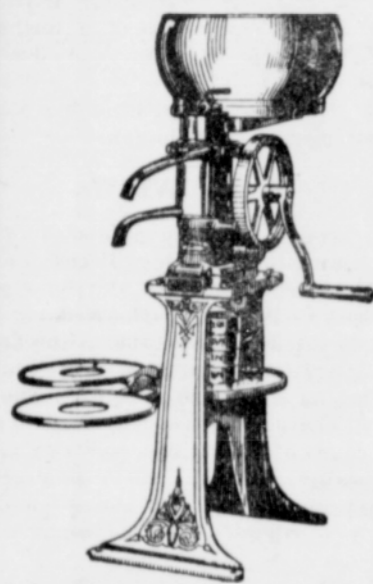

Outlook's Picture Service

The six pictures of world-wide celebrities which appeared on the front page of last Friday's Outlook surprised many persons who wondered how they came to be published so quickly in connection with the story of the great peace conference which met only the day before.

The explanation is simple. The Outlook recently installed a stereotyping machine which can reproduce any existing picture from a paper matrix. It was in that way the pictures were made in the Outlook office only a few hours before going to press.

Installation of the machine carries with it a picture news service contract by which the matrices are furnished. These reproductions are easy with the facilities at hand and the cuts are similar to those made in the art departments of the big dailies with the exception that the outfit must depend on the mats which are sent for producing the picture.

The big newspapers have a complete department devoted to reproducing all kinds of photographs. That work cannot be done here in this office for lack of an etching plant, but in all other respects the work of illustrating a newspaper is almost similar.

The matrices received by the Outlook cover a wide scope, ranging from portraits of the most noted people on earth to pictures of towns, ships, monuments, objects of interest, down to advertising cuts. The first instalment received last week covered about 150 subjects, and among them were the six notables whose portraits were printed. The possibilities are unlimited, and as the service will be continued the readers of this paper will hereafter be shown a great variety of pictures of this kind.

New subjects will be continually arriving. When a man or woman becomes famous, notorious or of more than passing account the service corporation will send the matrix and the picture will be reproduced.

It will be the same with many places of importance. Among the matrices now on hand may be found an excellent picture of New York City, the White House, the Eiffel tower and several other buildings.

The plant will be of great benefit to the job printing department of the Outlook, as many reproductions of type can be made. Advertisements may also be stereotyped. In such cases the matrices will be made here, but the office is not prepared just yet for doing such work. It expects to be able to do it, however, before long.

Altogether it is a progressive step in the Outlook's existence and one that is sure to be appreciated in view of the great events that are now happening. The service will be continued and improved upon.

HAY-LIVESTOCK BALANCE ESSENTIAL TO SUCCESS

The advisability of maintaining a proper balance between the amount of hay and livestock produced on the farms of Oregon is pointed out by G. R. Hyslop, professor of farm crops at the Agricultural college.

"The outlet for hay is livestock," he says. "The market for hay is through livestock. There is no hope for the hay farmer unless there is livestock to consume the hay."

"The livestock man, on the other hand, is between the buyer of livestock and the grower of hay."

"At this time of shortage of forage and extremely high price for all types of livestock feed some stockmen are reducing their herds and flocks to foundation stock rather than buy feed. Just as surely as this movement continues we shall have a surplus of hay and a period of low profit for the hay farmer."

"To avoid this situation it behooves every farmer to produce hay of the very best quality so the livestock men can get the largest possible returns from its use—hay of good quality and worthy of good prices."

"Growing vetch should not be discontinued because of aphid injury last season, as indications point to but slight damage from vetch aphid next year. Farmers may find vetch hay to be one of their best hay crops next year."

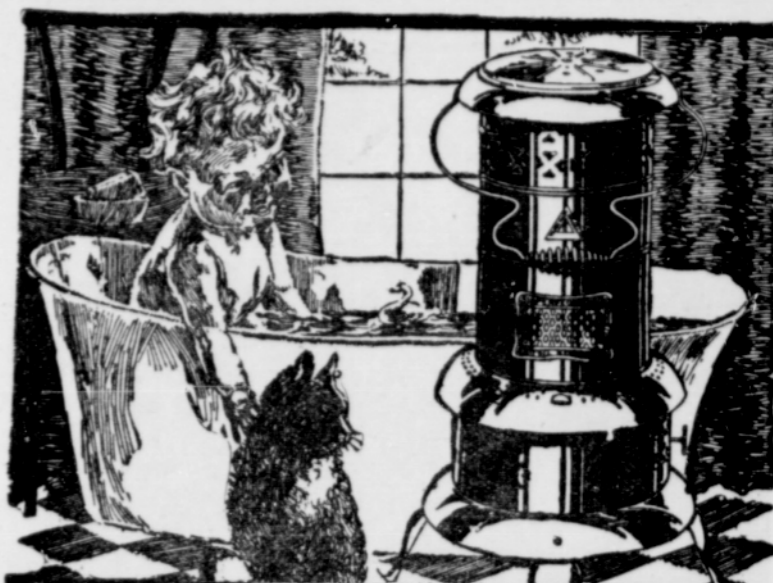

The main provisions of the copyright act of June 1, 1909, are that two copies of the work, as printed—not in manuscript—together with the fee of \$1, shall be sent, as soon as possible after publication, to the copyright office, library of congress, Washington, D. C. The original term of copyright is for twenty-eight years and upon application within the year preceding the date of its expiration, it may be renewed by the author or his heirs or executor for another period of twenty-eight years.

A vast light railway system has been created in France, according to the British war cabinet for 1917, involving the supply during last year of approximately 1,700 miles of track and the whole of the equipment. Exclusive of these light railway systems the total mileage of permanent railway track supplied complete to all the theatres of war was about 3,000 miles.
