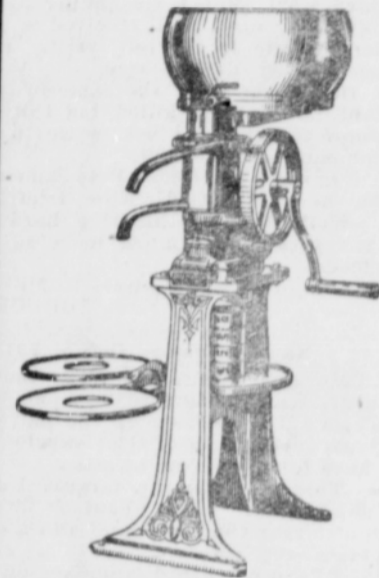

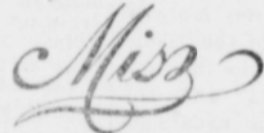

### FOUR SHORT STREETS TO BE IMPROVED

Four Gresham streets are to be improved, by order of the town council at a meeting held last night. They are First and Second streets west from Main, and Third and Fourth west from Hood avenue to end of said streets. The recorder was instructed to prepare notices of improvements.

The repair of sidewalk on South Main street in front of the Japanese gardens was left in the hands of the street committee and recorder.

Dr. W. J. Ott and Herry Lusted are to be notified to provide satisfactory drainage across their property so as to provide for drainage between Roberts avenue and Main street.

The fire apparatus of the city was ordered insured to the amount of \$1000.

Councilman D. G. Geddes was selected as a member of the board to act with the mayor and recorder in canvassing the votes of the recent city election.

The old street light at the intersection of Powell street and Roberts avenue was ordered moved to a more suitable place on South Roberts avenue.

On complaint of J. H. Hoas the street committee was instructed to take proper action in regard to faulty drainage near the complainant's property.

### AGED MAN PASSES AWAY FOLLOWING PARALYSIS

William Henry Harrison Hamilton, whose serious illness was recorded in a recent issue of the Outlook, passed away peacefully at his home in Montavilla on November 5, aged 85 years, 2 months and six days, following a stroke of paralysis. He is survived by his widow, by six sons and two daughters. They are Rev. C. L. Hamilton, Marshfield; W. H. Hamilton, Jr., Portland; E. D. Hamilton, Gresham; Elba and Elmer Hamilton, Portland; Walter H. Hamilton, San Francisco; Mrs. Edith Whitesides and Mrs. Cora Cook, Portland.

Mr. Hamilton was born in Piquaway, Ohio, August 30, 1833. On July 2, 1853, he married Maria McElliot, in Akron, Ohio. Eight sons and three daughters were born of this union. He enlisted in the Civil War in 1861 in the 67th Ohio Volunteer Infantry and re-enlisted in 1864 in the 182d regiment. The family moved to Oregon a few years ago and for a time Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton lived near their son Ed. and family at Lusted. Both were life-long members of the Methodist Episcopal church and devout christians. The following stanzas, repeated by his aged wife, brought comfort to the dying man: "Prayer is the christian's vital breath.

The christian's native air,  
His watchword at the gates of death.  
We enter heaven by prayer.

"Jesus can make a dying bed  
Feel soft as downy pillows are,  
While on his breast I lay my head  
And breathe my life out sweetly there."

Private services were conducted yesterday at the W. H. Hamilton undertaking parlors in Montavilla by Rev. Hiram Gould, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, assisted by Rev. C. Howard Davis, pastor of Church of the Nazarene. The text was Genesis 50:13. The hymns sung were "The City Foursquare" and "There Will be no Disappointment in Heaven." All surviving children were present at the funeral, the sons acting as pall bearers. Interment was in the family plot at Mt. Scott cemetery.

### FORMER GRESHAM WOMAN DEAD, DAUGHTER LOW

D. M. Cathey received a telegram Thursday, November 7, of the death of his sister, Mrs. Jennie Cathey LaDue of Greenville, Illinois. She had gone to Aberdeen, South Dakota, to be with her daughter Eunice, who had been teaching there. When the influenza broke out, the daughter, having taken training, volunteered to nurse in the emergency hospital. She contracted the disease, pneumonia developed, and she is now very low.

### YOUNG SHIPWORKER DIES IN PORTLAND

Frank L. Kenney, aged 28, a shipworker in the Grant Smith-Porter shipyards at St. Johns, died of influenza at the Auditorium emergency hospital in Portland on Wednesday. He is survived by his widow and little son aged three. The widow was formerly Miss Nellie Jones of the Melrose neighborhood. She is reported to be seriously ill.

### GRESHAM WOMAN DIES AT PORTLAND HOSPITAL

Mrs. Johanna Anderson died at Emanuel hospital in Portland on Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock, of paralysis. She has been slowly failing for the past year and was taken seriously ill a week ago last Tuesday. She was taken to the hospital and was operated on Saturday and was believed improving but she gradually grew worse.

Mrs. Anderson was born in Sweden on June 24, 1856. When 24 years of age she was married to the late Peter Anderson. Three years after her marriage she came to the United States to join her husband who had preceded her. Four years later she moved with her family onto a farm in southern Minnesota in the midst of a vast prairie. After ten years on the farm they moved to Wells, Minnesota, in order to give the children school advantages. This was their home until seven years ago when Mr. and Mrs. Anderson and their daughter Eva came to Oregon and made Gresham their home.

Mrs. Anderson was a devoted mother, fond of her home. Her desire was always to make her home a comfort and a joy. She is survived by four children, Axel and Arthur of Portland, Eva of Gresham and Oscar of East Orange, New Jersey.

Funeral services were held at the undertaking parlors of Wilson & Ross. On account of restrictions on gatherings in Portland only a few friends and the members of the family were present. The remains were laid to rest in Mt. Scott cemetery.

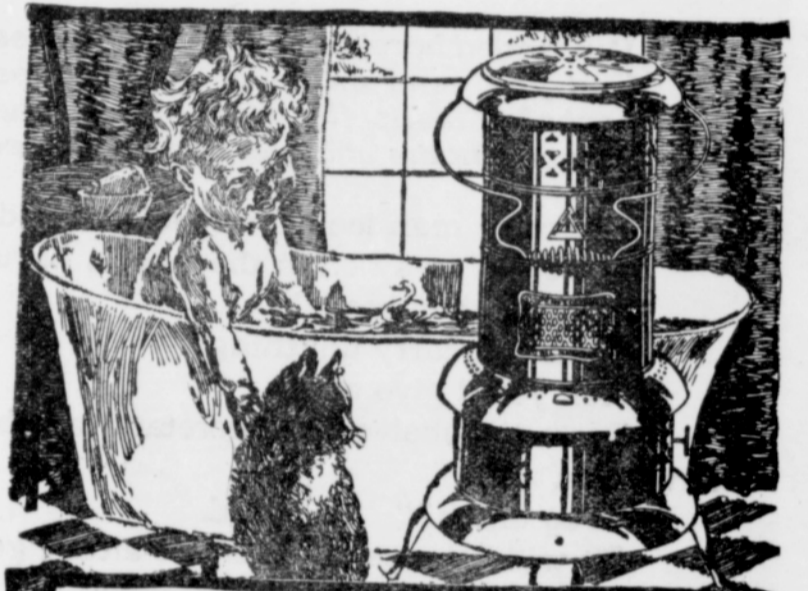
### THE OLD FORD RAMBLED AFTER BEING DITCHED
