#### STATE VOTE GIVEN ON MEN AND MEASURES

Official returns of the recent election from every county except Multnomah, from which the complete unofficial figures are used, show that United States Senator McNary defeated Oswald West by 18,164 votes. The vote was: McNary 82,339, West 64,175. West carried only two of the 36 counties—Deschutes and Jackson.

The official returns from every county, including Multnomah, on the Governorship, show that Governor Withycombe defeated Walter M. Pierce by a margin of 15,968, the vote being Pierce 64,980, Withycombe 80,948. Pierce carried only five counties. They were Deschutes, Harney, Linn, Marion and Union.

The same figures confirm the election of Judge A. S. Bennett, of The Dalles, to the Supreme Court by 403 votes over Circuit Judge Coke, of Marshfield. The final figures in the contest were: Bennett 12,304, Campbell 6169, Coke 11,896, Olson 10,608.

The vote on the seven measures follows:

Two new normal schools, yes 49,965, no 66,021.  
Home for delinquents, yes 43,237, no 65,291.  
Prohibiting fishing in Rogue River, yes 45,511, no 50,237.  
Closing Willamette river to fishing, yes 55,659, no 40,893.  
Delinquent tax bill, yes 66,652, no 41,595.  
Fixing rates for legal advertising, yes 50,171, no 41,826.  
Increasing state tax levy, yes 41,365, no 56,974.

#### JUSTICE AND FAIR PLAY.

Colonel Alexander P. Moore, publisher of the Pittsburg Leader, and one of the worst corporation baiters in the country, never overlooked an opportunity to attack the street railway company of his city. He turned loose in the most vicious form when the company had to ask for increased fare or go broke. Here is Colonel Moore's own story, as told by himself in columns of his own paper:

"I was very busy attacking the company in Pittsburg, and I strove as earnestly as I could to see that it didn't get the increased fare its officials said it must have if it was to live.

"As an outcome of the fight I learned something. The company was denied the raise and driven into the hands of a receiver. Some unthinking ones believed that a victory. It wasn't. It was a defeat. The receiver quickly proved to the court that even a six-cent fare wasn't enough and that he must have a seven-cent fare if the company was to meet the increased wage scale and the inflated prices for material, with the greater cost of maintenance and operation. Today the people of Pittsburg are paying a seven-cent fare."

Referring to higher fare granted steam roads when taken over by government, Colonel Moore adds: "In very truth the trolley lines are doing the same kind of work steam roads are doing; are buying the same kind of materials and paying almost the same wages. Their conditions and their needs are parallel. We cheerfully accord full justice to one and deny it to the other.

"Possibly we shall never learn to like the street car companies; possibly we shall never become wise enough to consider them an important portion of our municipal machinery and, therefore, to be handled with care and consideration, but in war times when every factory and every foundry is running day and night on war orders, and armies of men and women are drawing the largest wages ever drawn by the men and women of any country in the world, it is wise to foster the transportation companies those same kind of factories and foundries depend upon for the delivery of their help.

This is a good object lesson for many western cities.

#### OIL NOW AVAILABLE FOR ROAD PURPOSES

The signing of the armistice in no way alters the rules and regulations of the fuel administration now in force, but by Act of Congress, the fuel administration continues until the promulgation of the treaty of peace and its powers extend to the production, distribution and conservation of "fuel, including fuel oil and natural gas," according to U. 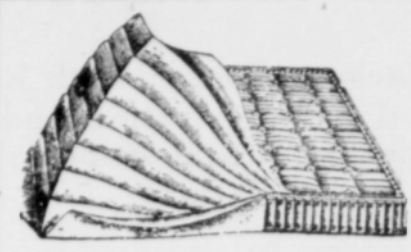
