Oliver, the eldest, is in France. Willard has just returned from France where he was wounded in the battle of Chateau Thierry. The sisters and the other brother are Mrs. Lois Moore, Myrtle, Lulu, Edna, Florence, Erma and Robert.

The funeral services were held at the Gresham Methodist church yesterday afternoon. They were conducted by Rev. J. Montcalm Brown, assisted by Rev. W. E. Kloster, pastor of Woodlawn Methodist Episcopal church, of which "Benny" was a member. The young man was a devoted Christian and was especially interested in missionary work, which he hoped to take up himself.

E. C. MORRISON LAID TO REST YESTERDAY

The funeral of E. C. Morrison, who died of pneumonia on November 18, was held from Finley's undertaking parlors yesterday forenoon. Rev. Edward H. 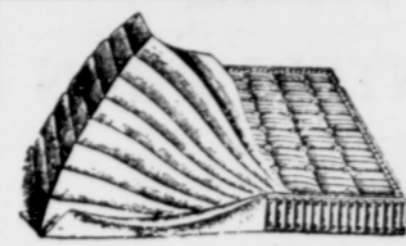
