Sergeant and Mrs. Thompson were married last May, while the sergeant was stationed at Camp Lewis and Mrs. Thompson was assistant principal of our high school, the marriage occurring three weeks before the end of the school year, June 5, and June 6 Mrs. Thompson went to Camp Lewis to be with her husband during the time he was in training there and on June 11 Sergeant Thompson started for New York to embark for his trip over seas and the young wife returned to the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lasley to await the end of the war and the return of her husband. Mrs. Thompson is principal of Corbett Union High school No. 1, and is so very bravely continuing her excellent work in the school, and the students and patrons should show their patriotism by making her work as pleasant and light as possible at this time.

STANDARD CLUBS TO BE ORGANIZED

Organization of standard clubs in girls' and boys' club work in Oregon is a new policy announced by H. C. Seymour, state club leader. To qualify as a standard club at least five members must work on the same project, and the club must have local officers and an adult leader and hold at least six meetings and one local exhibit within the year. One demonstration team must give a demonstration in the community, and a judging team must be provided. Seventy per cent of the members must file final reports with the state club leader. Standard club charters and national seals of achievement will be given all clubs that meet these requirements. Approximately 13,000 club members in the state are affected by these rulings.

FIRE DESTROYS THE HOME OF E. P. SCHEEDEN

A fire of mysterious origin completely destroyed the home of E. P. Scheeden on the Damascus road just across the Clackamas county line on Wednesday of last week, together with nearly all of the household belongings. The house was a good one, built only a few years ago. It was partially covered by insurance.

The first intimation of the conflagration was given when Mr. Scheeden's father went to his room on the second floor about 10 o'clock in the forenoon and on opening the door found it in a mass of flames. Work was commenced at once to save the furniture, some of which was carried out. Among the things lost were several hundred cans of fruit and a supply of meat for the winter. The elder Mr. Scheeden lost some money and a considerable amount of unregistered war savings stamps besides many papers and relics of little intrinsic value but which were highly prized by him.

The family, consisting of Mr. and Mrs. Scheeden, the former's father and seven children, the youngest six weeks old, moved at once into an old house on the place, where they have been assisted by neighbors in making themselves comfortable. Plans have been made for the building of a new and modern house, which will be commenced at once.

FUEL SITUATION IS EASIEST IN OREGON

Many states are organizing "Bura Wood" campaigns under the direction of the United States Fuel Administration in conjunction with the forest service. The plan involves having town and county wood fuel deputies arrange for wood at reasonable prices for villages and small cities, through the operation of a wood yard, and taking orders from consumers and then urging farmers to supply it at a fair price. Wood cutting clubs will be organized and a system of competition inaugurated among them. The scheme is most popular in eastern states where the fuel shortage is more acute than in the west. Fuel Administrator Fred J. Holmes does not believe such a step is necessary in Oregon.
