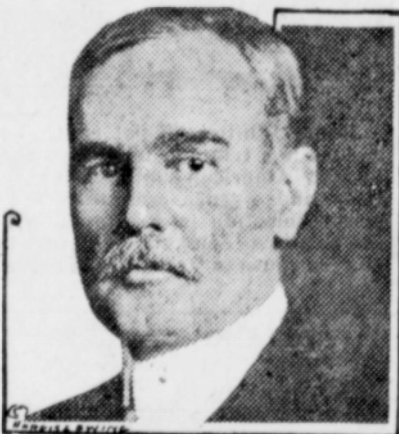

REFUNDS BEING MADE ON EXCESS CHARGES

A total of \$647.18 has been refunded to Oregon fuel consumers by the Washington Fuel Administration as a result of overcharges made by coal operators and brokers. The sum of \$745.43 has been paid to the Portland Chapter of the American Red Cross, on overcharges of small amounts, where it was deemed impracticable to locate the ultimate consumer. These refunds were collected by the Fuel Administration from coal operators making the excess charges. Investigations have also been made by the Oregon Fuel Administration of similar nature, which will result in a number of refunds being made from that office.

EVEN PRESIDENTS GET JOBS BACK.



John D. Ryan is back dealing in copper and doing business at the old stand. The boss of Uncle Sam's Aircraft Board, who quit his business to answer the call, has been re-elected president of the Anaconda Copper Mining Co. Ryan resigned his post more than a year ago to straighten out the aircraft production.

H. W. Snashall, president of the Farmers Mutual Fire Relief Association, reports the association has broken all former records in 1917. The annual statement shows 383 new members gained, 17 fire losses paid, aggregating \$4911; \$1,036,677 of insurance written, one assessment levied, and \$799 invested in liberty bonds during the year. The association is entering its 14th year, and has over 4000 members carrying \$4,259,000 insurance. It has made an annual saving of over 50 per cent to its members. At the annual meeting in January Andrew Brugger of Gresham was re-elected director for the ninth year. Farmers desiring to join may obtain information from H. W. Snashall, Gresham, R.
