

MEMBERS OF S. A. T. C. ARE COMING HOME

Work on the papers necessary to the discharge of the Students' Army Training Corps unit at the University is expected to begin the first of this week. Due to delay in receiving printed forms and instructions from the war department, work has been delayed for a week.

About forty men have signified officially their intention of leaving school as soon as they get their discharge. Most of these men are business men who wish to return to business life. Many of them have families, and entered the S. A. T. C. for the military training only. These men will receive their discharges first. Men who desire to return to the University next term to take the regular college work will be the last to be discharged.

The business office has received numerous inquiries from former students, concerning the work which is to be offered next term, since many of them now in army camps in this country expect to be able to return to college as soon as they get out of the army. This number will make up for any losses that may result from the disbanding of the S. A. T. C. according to Karl W. Outhank, secretary to President P. L. Campbell.

The naval unit at the University, consisting of fifty men, will probably be disbanded the same as the army corps students, Ensign Heppenheimer said. So far none have signified their intention of staying in the navy, and should any do so they will be sent to some naval training station.

Men of the corps will receive their pay up to the time of their discharge. They will not, however, be paid for the period from October 1 to 14, the date of their formal induction, Colonel Bowen said on receipt of orders from Major Patten, Helena, Mont.

The barracks, which have housed 200 men of company A, will revert to the University. No definite plans have as yet been made for the use of the building, although it may be moved onto the campus and used for offices.

All the men will be issued their uniforms, which they will be allowed to retain for four months after discharge. At the end of this time they must be turned over to the depot quartermaster at Fort Mason, San Francisco.
