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THE FOUR-MINUTE MEN.

In appreciation of their services in educating the people in practical patriotism and in arousing them to a sense of their full responsibilities in the war, the bureau of public information at Washington is awarding certificates of honorable discharge from service to the four-minute men of the country.

With the exception of the newspapers—which, by the way, have received nothing more than the thanks of a few officials, and have often been hampered by the government while loyally responding to every call or request—the government had no more valuable publicity agent than the four-minute man, and it would be hard to estimate just how much he really did contribute toward the winning of the war.

The four-minute man having proved his worth in promoting a good cause should not be lost sight of. Municipal governments can use him to good advantage in waging campaigns for civic improvement.

In the future when there is a matter to be presented to the people of any community, looking to the interests of all the people, the service of four-minute men should be secured. For instance, the matter of city and county consolidation will likely be submitted to the people at the next election.

BALANCED RATIONS, PROFITABLE TREES

Growth and fruitfulness of trees depend upon a proper balance between the nitrates and carbohydrates, even though all other conditions are favorable.

If abundant nitrates are available but carbohydrates are lacking the vegetation is weak and the plant is unfruitful.

If nitrates are abundant and carbohydrates also plentiful heavy vegetation growth results with barrenness and sterility.

If nitrates are relatively decreased carbohydrates increase with lessened vegetation and increased fruitfulness and fertility.

If nitrates are further increased without at the same time preventing an increase in carbohydrates both vegetation and fruitfulness are suppressed.

In all these relationships it is assumed that other plant foods, moisture and growing conditions are present.

It is pointed out by C. I. Lewis, chief of horticulture, that while other compounds are concerned with the growth and fruitfulness of plants the experiments were concerned chiefly with the carbohydrates, nitrates and moisture.

It is further shown that these factors are measurably within the control of the grower through tillage, pruning and fertilization.

H. W. Snashall, president of the Farmers Mutual Fire Relief Association, reports the association has broken all former records in 1917.

The annual statement shows 383 new members gained, 17 fire losses paid, aggregating \$4911; \$1,036,677 of insurance written, one assessment levied, and \$700 invested in liberty bonds during the year.

The association is entering its 14th year, and has over 4000 members carrying \$4,250,000 insurance. It has made an annual saving of over 50 per cent to its members.

At the annual meeting in January Andrew Brugger of Gresham was re-elected director for the ninth year.
