SENATE BILL AMENDED

County Treasurer by the Chairman of the County Boundary Board."

3d. Strike out the word "twenty" in line 2 of the title of the bill, and insert in lieu thereof the words "twenty-five."

Section 3. Each member of the county board of education shall, within ten days after receiving notice of his election take an oath that he will perform faithfully the duties of his office. Such oath may be taken before anyone authorized by the law to administer oaths. If any person so elected shall fail to take such oath within the time prescribed, "or shall cease to be a resident of the zone from which he was elected, the office shall be considered vacant. Any vacancy on the Board from any cause shall be filled by the County Boundary Board, such appointee to serve until the next annual election, when his successors shall be elected as hereinabove prescribed, and such successor shall serve the remainder of the unexpired term."

Each county board of education shall meet within ten days after election at the call of the county school superintendent and shall organize by electing one of its members president and another vice president, both of whom shall serve for one year, or until their successors are elected.

The county school superintendent shall act as secretary of the board and shall keep a full record of the proceedings of the board.

The regular meetings of the county board of education shall be held at the office of the county superintendent. At the time of the first meeting, the board shall fix the time for holding its regular meetings. Regular meetings shall be held at least every month, and when necessary other meetings may be held at the call of the president or any two members. A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum at any regular or special meeting.

Each member of the county board shall be paid his actual and necessary expenses incurred during his attendance at any meeting of the board. Such expenses itemized and verified shall be paid from the county board of education fund upon warrants signed by chairmen of the board and the county school superintendent.

Section 4. All the property, real and personal, belonging to the second and third districts, or to any union high school districts within any corporate limits of the county school district created by virtue of this act shall become the property of said school district and be subject to control of the county board of education of said county school district chosen in accordance with this Act.

All indebtedness now outstanding, whether evidenced by bonds, orders, warrants or otherwise of any second or third class district or union high school districts coming under the supervision and control of the county board of education shall by virtue of this act be and become the obligations of said county school district.

11th. "This act shall not apply to joint districts located in two or more counties, unless now until at a regular or special school election held in such district, a majority of the legal voters voting at such election, and a majority of the legal voters in each portion of such district situated in each county affected, shall have voted to come within the provisions of this act."

Provided, however, that if such district, by said majority votes as hereinabove specified, shall decide to come under the provisions of this act, then it shall be in all respects held to be under and subject to the provisions of this act, and the amount of tax levied shall be the amount as estimated in the annual budget of the County Board of Education for the maintenance of said County School District, and shall be in such ratio to the whole amount to be levied for such County School District as the assessed valuation of the property of such joint district bears to the assessed valuation of the whole of such County School District."

Section 5. The duties of the county board of education in county school districts shall be:

(1) To establish and maintain elementary schools, high schools and vocational schools; fix the days of the year and the hours of the day when such schools shall be in session; to prescribe text books and courses of study for the use of such schools and to change the same whenever in the judgment of the board such change is desirable, provided that the choice of text books shall be at the same time as that now or hereafter prescribed by law for the choice of text books for the state.

(2) At their discretion to provide for transportation of pupils or to pay tuition of pupils residing within the boundary of the county school district and attending some other district.

(3) To employ teachers, janitors, carpenters, etc., and to fix their compensation.

(4) To lease and build school houses, and to buy and lease land for school purposes; to furnish their school houses with proper furniture, light, fuel, apparatus, etc., and to sell and convey such lands and other property belonging to the district as may not in

their judgment be required for school purposes.

(5) To make an annual report to the taxpayers of said districts.

(6) To determine who are non-resident pupils, and fix the rates of tuition for such pupils.

(7) To fix a tax to be levied for the support of the district. On or before the first day of December in each year the board of directors of the county school district shall prepare a budget for the ensuing calendar year of such sums of money as it may deem necessary for the following purposes, after deducting the anticipated amount apportioned from the state and county funds. Said budget shall show the following items, to-wit:

(a) The salaries of all teachers, truants officers, janitors, etc., supported or employed by the board.

(b) All necessary incidental and contingent expenses, including the necessary repairs of buildings and construction of buildings.

(c) The purchase of sites, of fuel and light, supplies, text books, repairs and purchases of school apparatus, books, furniture and fixtures and other articles, and services necessary for the maintenance, operation and support of the school system of the district.

The county board of education shall call a meeting during the first week in December of each year to act upon this budget, and shall give notice thereof to the various boards of the second and third class districts included within the limits of the county school district. This notice shall include a copy of the proposed budget. Any legal voter of the aforesaid districts may attend the meeting and shall be accorded a hearing on any item of such budget.

When the county board of education of the county school district shall have finally determined upon the statement of expenses for the items indicated in the budget, it shall be made the duty of the county superintendent to report to the county commissioners, the county assessor and the county clerk the amount of tax levied by the district for maintenance, and other purposes as prescribed by law. Unless specifically authorized by a majority of the legal voters upon the question, no county school district shall in any year levy a tax of more than six mills on the assessed valuation of such district.

Section 6. Such county board of education of the county school district are authorized to contract an indebtedness for the district for school purposes, but such indebtedness shall at no time exceed in the aggregate \$100,000.00.

This Act shall in no way limit the amount of any levy necessary to be made for the paying of any bonded debt or warrants heretofore lawfully issued against any school district.

Section 7. In all counties coming under the provisions of this Act, the county school superintendent shall make an apportionment of the entire school fund then in the county treasury arising from the levy of the county school tax and the interest on the irreducible state fund in the same manner and at such times as are now, or may hereafter, be apportioned to the various first, second and third class districts as provided by law.

All moneys so apportioned to the second and third class districts, and all other funds from whatever source to be sued for the maintenance and support of schools under the control of the county board of education, shall be in the custody of the county treasurer and paid out by him on warrants authorized by said board and signed by the chairman and county school superintendent. All such funds shall be known as the county board of education fund.

Section 8. The second and third class districts now organized within the limits of the county school district shall after this Act becomes a law, be known as such districts, and the boundaries shall be and remain the same as shown by the record of the county superintendent.

The county board of education may establish new districts, change the boundaries of any existing districts, or consolidate two or more districts into one, and the officers of such district so consolidated. "Provided that the boundaries of none of the present second or third class districts shall be changed, except upon the petition of a majority of the legal voters residing in such district. The board of directors of second and third class school districts located within a county school district shall be the same, and elected at the same time and manner as officers in second and third class school districts of the state. The principal or teacher in charge of the school in each of said second and third class districts located within a county school district shall be ex-officio clerk of the board. If a vacancy occur in the office of director in such second or third class district, the county school superintendent shall appoint some person to fill the unexpired term.

Section 9. The duties of boards of directors in second and third class school districts shall be as follows:

(1) To arrange for public meetings at such times as they may decide for the free and orderly discussion of all questions which concern the social, moral, political and economic welfare of the community.

(2) To secure speakers, suggest
