GRESHAM GRANGERS RESOLVE AGAINST COUNTY CONSOLIDATION

Gresham grange No. 270 met in an all-day session in the grange hall on Powell street on Saturday, the brisk showers failing to dampen the ardor of the members, who attended in goodly numbers.

The transaction of the routine business of the grange occupied the morning session, Master E. E. Wellington presiding. At noon George F. Honey, steward, ushered the members and their guests into the banquet hall, where another of the famous grange dinners was enjoyed.

An open meeting for the installation of officers drew a further attendance of members and visiting grangers in the afternoon. Following the opening exercises and singing by the assembly, Mrs. J. R. Cavanaugh, assisted by Past Master W. B. Parsons, proceeded with the impressive and beautiful ritual of installation. Mrs. Frank Hodge and Mrs. J. N. Clannahan furnishing the piano accompaniment to the work. E. E. Wellington enters upon his third year as master. George Leslie, treasurer, and Mrs. Frank Hodge, secretary, retain the offices they have held so long and filled so acceptably. Other in-coming officers are E. A. Leonard, overseer; Mrs. W. R. Kern, lecturer; George F. Honey, assistant steward; Mrs. R. F. Walters, chaplain; W. R. Kern, gatekeeper; Miss Alberta Allen, Ceres; Mrs. Theodore Brugger, Flora; Mrs. E. E. Wellington, lady assistant steward; Mrs. Dan Metzger, and Mrs. John Sleret, both of whom were absent, will be installed in the offices of steward, and Pomona, respectively, at a future meeting. Several of these officers are serving second terms.

A discussion of the merits of the proposed consolidation plan for the merging of Portland and Multnomah county into the city and county of Portland, as contained in the amendment to the state constitution now under consideration in the senate of the state, was opened by Judge George Stapleton.

This bill, which provides for the swallowing up of the remainder of the county by the city of Portland, would, upon passing both house of the legislature, be submitted to the voters of the entire state for enactment. It is obvious that sufficient lobbying by the voters of Portland would readily sell the proposition to the people over the state, who of course have no special interest in the matter. If voted upon favorably, the bill then authorizes the mayor of Portland to appoint a charter board of twenty-one members, not less than three of whom must be residents of the county outside of Portland, which board is allowed fifteen months to

prepare a workable charter for the consolidated territory.

Aside from other objectionable features of the measure, the question of increased taxes presents itself at once. In this matter the county would be absolutely at the mercy of charter commission, that body determining the rate of taxation according to urban and rural zones of their own grading, at varying distances from the advantages of city utilities. There does not seem to be in this bill sufficient guarantee of these advantages to the county at large to warrant any increase in taxes, or to justify its acceptance by the voters of this end of the country.

Further consideration of the measure, with expressions of opinion from George F. Honey, E. A. Leonard, Mrs. J. N. Clannahan, Judge Morrow of Woodlawn grange; H. L. Ball and M. H. Wheeler of Multnomah grange; Mrs. J. R. Cavanaugh, W. B. Parsons, and others, resulted the unanimous adoption of the following resolutions, presented by Judge Stapleton.

Whereas, There has been introduced in the senate of the state of Oregon a proposed amendment to the constitution of the state, the same being designated as Joint Resolution No. 18, the purpose of said amendment being to authorize the consolidation of the governments of the city of Portland and of Multnomah county under the name of the "City and County of Portland" and

Whereas, If this amendment is adopted, and said consolidation is authorized, all the territory in Multnomah county, outside the limits of the city of Portland, will become a part of said city, and the city lines will be extended so as to include all of Multnomah county, and
