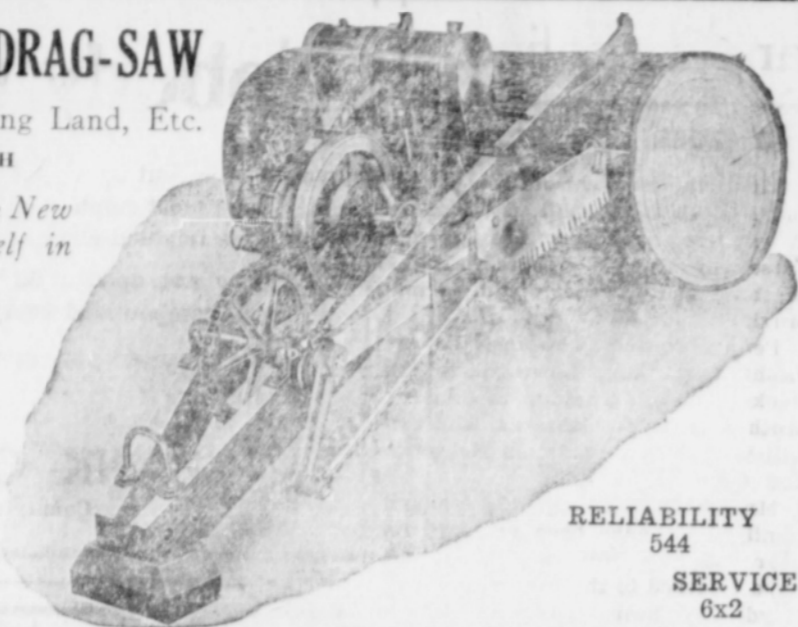

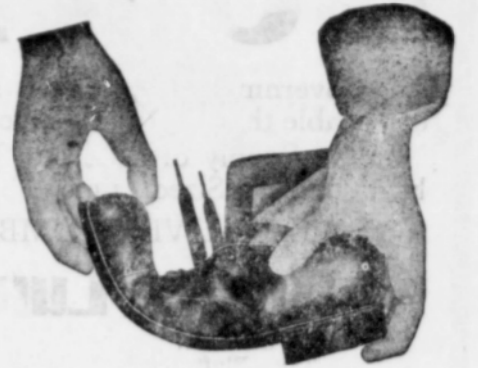
Dr. Wilbur Thompson who is here at the family home on Roberts avenue recuperating from a severe illness, is reported improved in health.
