**QUESTION BOX.**

This question was submitted to the Outlook office a week ago by a local farmer:

It is understood that wheat can be bought at world price, the government guaranteeing the difference. What steps will have to be taken to move wheat between neighbors?

We have talked the matter over with S. B. Hall, county agricultural agent, and present herewith his opinion.

A wheat transaction between neighbors can not be regarded as a deal on the open market. As the government has not at this time, and has not at any time during the period of the war, had absolute control of wheat until it was on the open market, transactions between neighbors on buying and selling wheat are absolutely up to the parties concerned, who may make their own terms regardless of any government regulation or guarantee.

During the trying period of wheat conservation, the impression was general that under the food regulation act the government had supreme control in every public or private wheat deal. This misunderstanding has led the general public into confusing ideas on the wheat situation. Under the law recently enacted by congress, authorizing the President to take any steps necessary to maintain wheat prices, the government will undertake to guarantee a \$2.20 price for first grade wheat on the open market.


