Floyd O. Lake, of Boring, had business at the Palmquist harness shop in Gresham yesterday.

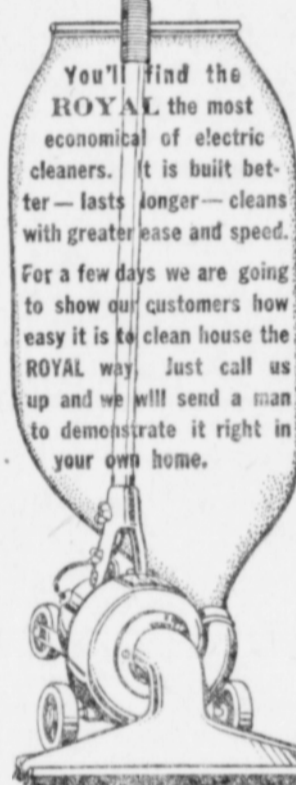

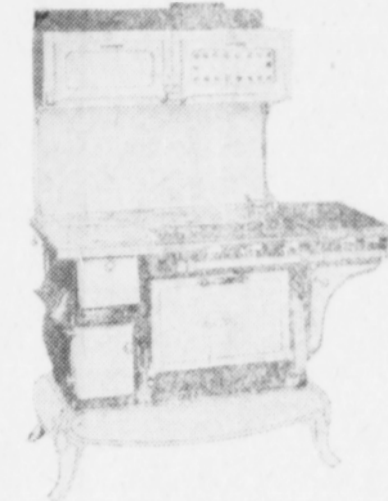

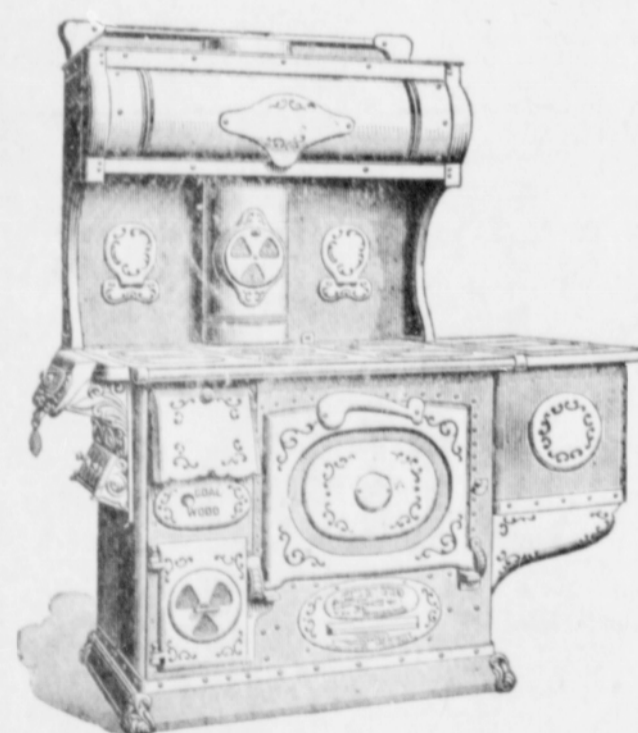
