EXAMINATION FOR MOTOR RURAL CARRIERS

Postmaster Roberts has received the following notice of examination to be held in Portland for motor rural carriers:

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an examination for the county of Multnomah, Oregon, to be held at Portland, on April 12, 1919, to fill the position of motor rural carrier at Gresham and vacancies that may later occur on motor rural routes from post offices in the above-mentioned county. The salary on motor routes ranges from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum. The examination will be open only to male citizens who are actually domiciled in the territory supplied with mail by a post office in the county and who meet the other requirements set forth in Form 2121 and 1977. Form 2121 may be seen posted at any post office in the county for which the examination is held, and Form 1977 and application blanks may be obtained from the offices at which the vacancy exists and where the examination is to be held, or from the United States Civil Service commission at Washington, D. C. The appointee to this position will be required to furnish, maintain, and operate a modern motor vehicle with a carrying capacity of not less than 800 pounds and a cubic capacity of not less than 80 feet. Applicants must file with their applications a statement of the equipment they will be able to provide in the event of appointment. Applications should be forwarded to the commission at Washington, D. C., at the earliest practicable date.

PIG CLUB WORKERS VISITED BY O. A. C. MAN

Phillip Fortner, live stock club worker from O. A. C., and Ethel Calkins, county club leader, spent the entire week holding meetings with the fourteen standard pig clubs in the county. They located pigs of the various standard breeds for the boys, demonstrated a sanitary watering pig trough, discussed feeds and conditions necessary to growing hogs successfully. The boys were taken to the home of the local leader where they inspected pig pens.

The Pleasant Valley pig club stands out from the others in that the seven boys selected pure-bred pigs of the Chester White breed, the only club that has all pure bred stock.

The clubs visited were Rockwood, Pleasant Valley, Gresham, Fairview, Lynch, Russellville, Troutdale, Corbett, Springdale, Orient, Lusted, West Portland, Sylvan, Powell Valley.
