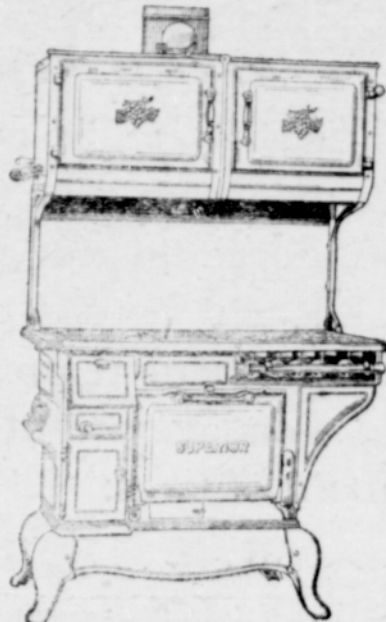
Frank Eder is working for the county, driving truck in road work.
