Fifty thousand negatives of unusual scenes all over the world are a part of the slides stored away in the photographic department of the Methodist centenary. The department is the largest of its kind in the world. Two hundred persons are employed in getting out slides, more than half of them being colorists. Seven hundred and forty six colored slides a day are made. The centenary cannot yet begin to supply the demand all over the country for these slides. They are not sold simply rented to churches and organizations. The colorists were trained specially for the work. So unusual is the work that if it were being done by a private individual for profit, he would find he had a goldmine.
